Mrs. E. G. Ford, who arranged the program for the afternoon, gave an interesting and illuminating account of the history of the foundation from its establishment in 1901 until the present time. Mr. Rockefeller, according to Mrs. Ford, is the largest public benefactor in the world in point of second.

Among the projects which th foundation has sponsored are the organization of an institute of medical research which has solved some of the greatest health problems of the south; the establishment of the animal farm at Princeton for the study of the diseases of animals used for food; and the solving of the boll-weavil problem in April. of the south.

In Oregon, the Rockefeller foundation has given the sum of \$300,and also given Reed College onethird of the endowment of \$400,-000. Five counties of the state have been assisted with the organthe foundation. The universal policy of the foundation is that any sum which Mr. Roskefeller offers must be matched with an equal amount from some other source.
