**CHICAGO SCHOOL  
MAN GIVES TALK**  
Dr. McAndrew Declares  
Teachers Who Marry  
Should Not Be Fired

**SPOKANE, April 5.—(AP).—**  
A school boy ought to work like a business man; a teacher's marriage should not be a "madame-or" and a kindly chastisement is a healthy thing.

These were precepts laid down today by Dr. William McAndrew, former superintendent of schools in Chicago, before the 30th annual inland-empire educational association convention. More than 2,000 teachers were registered.

"They say the American home life is disappearing," McAndrew declared. "Of course, why shouldn't it?—With school children having so much school work to do at home . . . loading the child down with outside work. When I was a boy, after supper father got out the pinocchio deck and we all played pinocchio. . . . But the advanced school today in which the student works hard during the school hours and then shuts up his desk and goes home and forgets his school until the next day, as the man in business does."

"And who is better fitted to teach than a woman who in addition to her own knowledge of a teacher has also that more intimate knowledge of the home?"  
At a banquet tonight Dr. McAndrew was presented with a leather portfolio on behalf of the teachers of Spokane. Speakers at the banquet included Miss Cornelia Adair, president of the national education association; Chancellor M. A. Brannon, of the University of Montana; Dr. W. H. Burton of New York City and C. A. Howard, superintendent of Oregon schools.

M. M. Hill, Hood River, for election as a delegate to the democratic national convention from the second congressional district.

**Thumb Print Used On  
Dresses In London**

**LONDON (AP).—**Thumb prints as trade marks have been adopted by some of London's most exclusive dress designers with the aim of outwitting smaller dealers who retail copies of their gown creations as genuine. "Dress pirates" these shop keepers are called by the dressmakers who pride themselves on their originality.

One designer of note conceived the idea of protecting her name by the thumb print method and others quickly followed the lead. The prints are generally those of the designer, stamped indelibly on the cloth.

Another designer conceived the idea of having his models patented, on the contention that they are woven on special looms and from raw material obtained only from one source, but certain legal obstacles have not yet been overcome.

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## HOOVER BOOSTED BY CALIFORNIANS

Three Governors, Including  
Present Incumbent,  
Favor Candidate

**LOS ANGELES, April 5.—(AP).—**The governor and two former governors of California today paid high tribute to the character and qualifications of Herbert Hoover, secretary of commerce in a meeting here which opened the Hoover-for-president campaign in southern California.

"There is no man who has had the world contacts of Herbert Hoover," declared Governor C. C. Young, in addressing the 600 persons who crowded the hotel auditorium where the meeting was held. "No man is better fitted for the presidency. Let us show the nation that California has but one candidate and that the entire state is wholeheartedly for him."

Former Governor Friend W. Richardson expressed the state's pride in Hoover as a Californian, as a republican, as "the man who would make the best president the United States ever had."

The third California governor to speak in praise of Hoover was William D. Stephens, Lieutenant Governor Burton R. Pitts and former Lieutenant Governor A. J. Wallace also were present.

A telegram from Secretary Hoover read at the meeting was: "May this message express my greetings and my appreciation. The loyal support of the republicans of California is most encouraging. I regret that it is impossible for me to be with you."

**Fish Wheel Law Appeal  
Will Be Heard April 18**

Hearing of the suit attacking the law eliminating the operation of fish wheels in the Columbia river, has been set by the United States supreme court for April 18, according to telegrams received at the attorney general's office Thursday.

The law was enacted by the voters two years ago. It prohibited the operation of fish wheels in the Columbia river, fishing with seines above Cascade Locks and limited the length of seines below that point.

The legislature, at its last session, attempted to repeal the law but failed. A bill then was passed by the legislature deferring for a period of one year the date on which the law would become effective. This law was vetoed by Governor Patterson.

The law was then attacked in the federal courts in Portland by McGowan and son. The court upheld the constitutionality of the law, whereupon an appeal was taken to the higher court.
