PROHIBITION WILL BE TRIED BY STATE

Federal Judge Refuses To Accept Jurisdiction; Writ Quashed

CHICAGO, April 6.—(AP)—Federal Judge James H. Wilkerson has ruled that Myron Caffey, federal prohibition agent, should be released from federal jurisdiction to the state for trial for shooting and wounding William Beatty, municipal court bailiff, in the course of a liquor raid.

Judge Wilkerson quashed a writ of habeas corpus cum causa he issued several days ago, but instructed that the order not be entered until next Wednesday morning. It was noted that the date of entry was one day after the state-wide primary set for next Tuesday.

The writ of habeas corpus was issued at a time when several automobile loads of armed city detectives waited outside the federal building for a ruling from the corporation counsel as to the legality of invading the building and taking Caffey by force.

Beatty was shot when the agents invaded a saloon in a search for Lorenzo M. Juliano, reputed head of a gang of illicit liquor gangsters.

Two stories of the shooting were told. One was that Beatty thought the prohibition agents were holdup men and was shot as he fled. The other was that Beatty was shot when he pulled a pistol and tried to resist the agents.

PET PARROT PASSES

ASTORIA, April 6.—(AP)—Starving sailors won't steal her rice nor threaten to serve her a la carte where Adelaide went today.

For Adelaide, the cockatoo mascot of the ill-fated five masted schooner K. V. Kruse, was asphyxiated today, a martyr to human forgetfulness.

Locked in the cabin as the schooner lay in quarantine off Astoria, Adelaide screamed her last bit of defiance at those who looked her when deathly fumes from sulphur pots, used to fumigate the craft, seeped through a crack in the door.

When Captain Billy Mayne, who with 14 other men survived the tortured voyage of 115 days from Adelaide, Australia, unlocked her cabin door today, Adelaide, rumped and silent, lay on her back near her cage. She was cold in death.

The cockatoo, Captain Mayne said, was named after the city she first saw when she came out of her jungle homeland. She proved a good sailor throughout the turbulent trip, showing verbal signs of dissatisfaction only when eight

pounds of her rice were used to feed the half-famished crew. They even threatened her life.

So Adelaide was buried today—buried like a true seaman when they lowered her into the waters of the Columbia.
