

# PASSENGER TRAIN HAS CLOSE ESCAPE

## Engine Plunges Into Swollen St. Lawrence River; Cars Stopped

MONTREAL, Que., April 10.—(AP)—One of the greatest ice jams ever formed in the St. Lawrence river choked the stream today, dammed up the water behind unprecedented heights and flooded sections of Longue Pointe, a suburb, to a depth of four feet. In this district the water was rising steadily and no relief was expected until the ice jam was broken. For half a mile inland from the river banks the flood waters had spread over streets and farms.

Passengers on a train, the front end of which plunged through a flood-weakened bridge near Drummondville last night, attributed their escape from death to the bravery and resourcefulness of a woman when they arrived here today.

They reported that Mrs. A. Grandin who lives on the banks of the St. Lawrence river, looked from her windows to see that the embankment between a highway bridge and the river bridge had been washed away by a flood so that the tracks were suspended in midair.

Making her way across the flooded fields between her house and the right of way of the Canadian National railway, Mrs. Grandin just succeeded in climbing to the tracks as the Quebec Montreal express hove in sight, headed full speed for the washout.

She waved a warning, the fireman shouted to the engineer and jumped, and the brakes screamed at engine and baggage car plunged through the unsupported trackage, through the embankment and express messenger were lost, but the passengers were only shaken up, as the cars in which they were riding stopped short of the washout.

# TWO KILLERS MUST HANG

State Supreme Court at New Orleans Hands Down Ruling

NEW ORLEANS, La., April 10.—(AP)—Mrs. Ada Lebouef and Dr. Thomas E. Dreher, must die on the gallows for slaying James J. Lebouef, the woman's husband, the state supreme court ruled today in denying them a new trial.

If further legal steps fail to save them, Mrs. Lebouef will be the first woman in Louisiana to be executed. The date will be set by Governor Simpson.

The woman and the physician, along with James Beadle, trapper, were accused of luring Lebouef on Lake Palourde, near Morgan City and murdering him. Beadle was found guilty, but the jury recommended mercy. He is serving a life sentence.

# HOOVER FORCES RESUME

Decision Made To Continue Active Campaign In Ohio

WASHINGTON, Apr. 10.—(AP)—The Hoover forces have decided to resume active campaigning in Ohio where activities have been curtailed since the recent death of Senator Willis.

The republican primaries are two weeks from tomorrow, and prior to that time Representative Burton, the veteran member of the house from Cleveland, expects to deliver a number of speeches in his home state in Hoover's behalf. He will resume campaigning at Youngstown Saturday night and expects next week to speak in Canton, Springfield, Columbus and possibly Toledo.
