EDITORIALS OF THE PEOPLE

About the Chautauqua
Editor Statesman:
I want to say a few words in reference to an article appearing in Thursday morning's paper entitled "Salem Might Cancel Chautauqua," by Dr. P. O. Riley of Hubbard, Oregon.

It reads: "Inasmuch as the Chautauqua here in Salem last season was a success and plenty of signers were secured to guarantee its return this year," etc.

In 1926 I was one of the signers for the season of '27. At the time of securing names or pledges under his instructions no doubt, made it plain that the Chautauqua financially had always been a success in Salem. The only reason for securing all those names he had on the dotted lines was to show the people of Salem and vicinity that we were standing for the best and noblest in the way of clean and high class entertainment. "It is just for your moral support."

At the time these names are asked for in the majority of cases is at the conclusion of the program when every one is in a hurry to get home and of course is not in a position to take the time to read all of the iron clad written contract. A few sign understanding the conditions, but the majority are new people. This is a good and sufficient contract for Ellison-White; the folks signing are legally bound to pay all expenses of the Chautauqua regardless of the financial conditions of the country. You will be called up to sell tickets and then make up all the balance out of your pocket.

Here is what I want to say: The Chautauqua in 1927 was not a financial success, although a crowded house greeted the entertainers at most every performance. In less than 24 hours after the show ended the local manager came to my office and informed me that a deficit existed and each man signing as I did was called on to pay something like thirteen dollars.

I refused to pay because they had deliberately lied to me, then the local manager got hard boiled and told me he would file suit against me in less than 24 hours, but for fear of good advertisement he failed to carry out his threat. Many others paid because of business reasons, not because they thought it right or just.

Man and Woman Flee As Automobile Crashes

PORTLAND, Ore., Apr. 13.—(AP)—Thrown from an automobile in which they were riding when it overturned after colliding with a delivery truck, three persons were injured, one perhaps fatally, at an intersection here tonight. One of the men hurt was identified as Cliff Jackson of Spokane. He was taken to a hospital suffering a skull fracture, and was reported in a critical condition. The other two passengers, a man and a woman, were said to have fled immediately after the accident. Both, it was reported, received face lacerations and bruises.

RUMORS CIRCULATE CONCERNING PLANE

Robert S. Fogg, New Hampshire Flyer, Mistaken for Germans

CONCORD, N. H. April 13.—(AP)—An airplane sighted at several points along the Maine coast today leading to the belief that it might have been the German monoplane Bremen, was identified as that of the Robert S. Fogg of this city, who was cruising along the coast in hope of meeting the trans-Atlantic flyers.

In a telephone call to this city this afternoon, Lieutenant Fogg reported that he had flown about 50 miles beyond Portland without discovering any trace of the German plane. Visibility was poor not exceeding five miles. He turned back and landed at Old Orchard. As his plane was seen flying along the coast in a southerly direction, it was mistaken for the Bremen until coast guardsmen at Cape Elizabeth, Maine, distinguished that it was a biplane, number 11.43.

BOSTON, Mass., April 13.—(AP)—Reports of unidentified airplanes seen at a half dozen scattered points in New England today kept watchers for the German trans-Atlantic plane Bremen busy without bringing to light any definite information.

Weather conditions throughout most of New England were clear and a watch was maintained along the entire coast from Eastport, Maine, south to Long Island sound. Ships and radio stations were on the alert for any sight of the plane or any wireless messages from points along the route the Bremen was expected to follow upon its arrival on the American side of the Atlantic.

Observers at Nassau, N. H., reported having seen a monoplane flying high above that city but they were unable to distinguish any identifying marks. A similar report came from Windham, N. H., and later from Massachusetts points in the vicinity of Worcester. None of the observers was able to identify the plane.
