

High School Athletes to Compete in Four Separate Contests Today

LOCALS SCHEDULE NUMEROUS EVENTS

With prospects of good weather for today, the Salem high school athletes will be out 100 per cent as they will compete in four different athletic events, these being golf, baseball, track and swimming.

The baseball fans are looking forward to their game this afternoon at Oxford park where they will meet the University high of Eugene in the first interscholastic contest of the season, beginning at 3 o'clock. The Salem high school nine have improved considerably during the past week, brushing up on many of the weaknesses brought out in its clash with the Chemawa nine a week ago in which Salem was handed a 22 to 4 defeat. Coach Luke Gill put his red and black ball tossers through a strenuous workout on the Willamette diamond last night, and all is now in readiness for the opening game.

The Eugene team is considered quite strong this season and it is believed that it will give the local high school a run for its money, although the Salemites are far from weak on the diamond.

The probable starting lineup for the Salem high team includes Gamble in the box, Wilson at the receiving end, Bechler covering first, Kitchen guarding second, Woolley at short, Belt on third, Bockey in left field, Lyons in center field and Bowden at right. "Frisco" Edwards will officiate.

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At 2 o'clock this afternoon the local high school tracksters will meet with the Silverton and Independence teams at the state fairgrounds cinder in the first triangular meet this season. Salem is doped to win by a safe margin, although Silverton is considered strong. Little is known as to the strength of the Independence team but at any rate it is believed that some keen competition will be afforded in many of the events.

Last week the Salem high spike-tronounced the local Y. M. C. A. track team 67 to 22, and after another week's practice are showing real championship form. Salem high school won the state track championship title last year and prospects look very favorable to repeat the stunt again this season according to Louie Anderson, high school athletic coach. Coach Anderson believes that the Salem high team will set a few state records this season as some of the men are showing some real stuff.
