'THE VULTURE' HAS PLEASING SUCCESS

A capacity audience greeted the Manhattan Players at the Elsinore Thursday evening and went away pleasantly satisfied at the company's production of a play that reminds of the old blood and thunder days when melodrama was melodrama and villains were villains indeed.

"The Vulture" is a piece possessing a multitude of thrills and just as many tense situations properly preceding those same thrills. There is a first class murder—super-first class, in fact, because it is no less a person than the district attorney who bites the well known dust. There are at least a half a dozen suspects and not less than two confessions—if you can beat that! Then there is the ubiquitous detective and last but by no means least, a very funny butler who has been taking a mail order course in fingerprinting. Of course, the arch-criminal is discovered and meets a nice bloody and picturesque death. And of course the young couple live happily ever after.

Allyn Lewis as the butler is sufficiently funny, as is Miss Rose Wood as a splinter. J. Burt Burton does well as the responsible, officious citizen who later—unmasked—yes ingloriously as "The Vulture," and Chas. Caulkins presents convincingly the hard-boiled dick. Miss Marie Miller is quite sweet and gracious in the feminine lead and Louis Dunn is likewise in the masculine ditto. Miss Grace Bentley has a dual role and plays both characters to perfection. There is good balance in all the parts, in fact, and the piece is presented altogether successfully.

"The Vulture" will be the attraction again this afternoon and tonight, sharing with "Speedy" the Saturday honors, matinee and evening. The play gets under way following the first picture at about 3:30, and in the evening at about 8:45. Bargain matinee this afternoon.
