OREGON DECLARATION DAY

Prof. J. B. Horner yesterday gave a new name to the event that makes old Champeog a shrine—
 He called it Declaration day, in his address to the largest gathering that was ever seen at the celebration of what has been known as founders' day and has been called by other titles.

There, on May 2, 1843, the Oregon country, all the Pacific northwest from the crest of the Rockies to the shores of the Pacific, and from the international to the California line, was by a vote of 102 men placed under the Stars and Stripes, and wrested from the domination of Great Britain. So it is appropriately Declaration day.

This Champeog shrine is to have a \$300,000 federal memorial building; a historic highway is to pass by it—
 And in all the years of the future increasing multitudes will gather there in commemoration of the great event of that historic May second of 85 years ago.

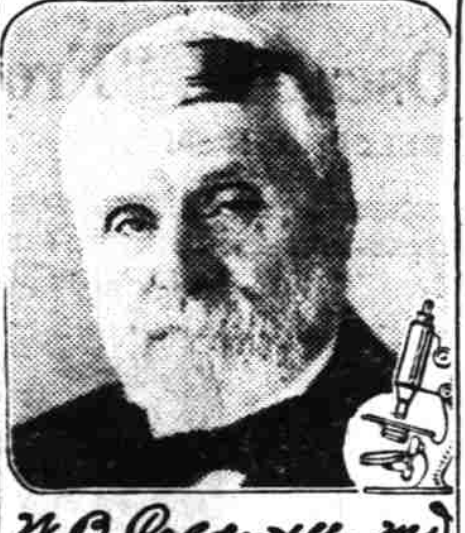




