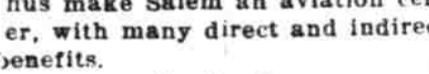

m. and arguments were begun when Chaney, the final witness, had undergone a severe cross examination at the hands of State Senator B. L. Eddy, special prosecutor.

Documents Analyzed—In closing arguments for the state, the assistant prosecutor dealt exclusively with the documentary evidence in the case. This evidence included a check for \$310, made out to J. M. Wilke special undercover operator working in the prohibition enforcement under Chaney's control. Evidence had been introduced during the trial tending to show that Wilke had been dismissed from the service before the check was issued and that he had never received it. The special prosecutor charged Chaney with misapplication of the funds derived from this check, but stressed the point that the state does not directly charge Chaney with forgery.

Senator Eddy objected to a defense statement that the state charged forgery had been committed. A lively tilt then ensued during which the defense moved for a directed verdict. The motion was denied.

The final argument by Senator Eddy was in progress when court recessed for dinner. Eddy thundered sarcasm in discussing the testimony of handwriting experts with the declaration that "each man is his own expert."

He also said: "Wilkie made a better witness than Chaney who was hesitant and evasive and sought to make every answer an argument to the jury."

OHIO GIRL SAID KIDNAPED

Ten-Year-Old Daughter of Youngstown Couple Abducted

YOUNGSTOWN, Ohio, May 17.—(AP)—In their humble home on the south side, Mr. and Mrs. Max Rosenbaum maintained ceaseless vigil tonight for their ten-year-old daughter, Beatrice, while the search for an unidentified man who abducted her in an automobile four days ago went forward.

The police investigation has failed to reveal any apparent motive for the kidnaping but Chief Wallace Metcalf, of the city vice squad said tonight that his men were working upon a new clue, the nature of which he would not divulge.

The new information came to the police after their efforts to identify one of three suspects ended without success.

Metcalf refused to say whether the new theory offers a plausible explanation of the stranger's reason for taking the child away. Beatrice is subnormal mentally and her speech is so defective that she can scarcely be understood.

ASHLAND DEBATERS WIN

Southern Oregon Twins Carry off State Championship

EUGENE, May 17.—(AP)—Richard and Adena Joy, twin debaters of Ashland high school, tonight won the championship of the Oregon high school debating league, defeating Pendleton high school, 2 to 1. The Ashland debaters, by virtue of having won the state championship twice previous years, became the permanent owners of the De Cou trophy.

The Ashland twins won the state championship for their high school last year. Tonight they were opposed by Robert Miller and Grace Mason, of Pendleton, champions of eastern Oregon. Pendleton, also, has twice won the championship and tonight made a bid for permanent ownership of the cup. Ashland upheld the negative of a question proposing repeal of the six per cent tax limitation statute.

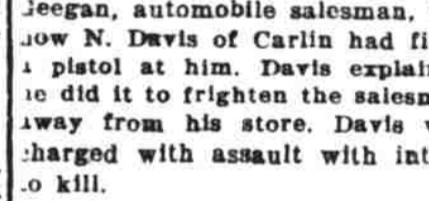
Jury at Reno, Nevada Gives its Official Approval
