

Luke Gill's Homer Gives Senators Victory Over Montavilla, 5 to 4

RUNNERS' BLUNDERS FATAL TO VISITORS

Luke Gill, labeled early in the season the "hitless wonder," broke up Wednesday's ball game with a screaming homer over the left field fence in the eighth inning, enabling the Salem Senators to defeat Montavilla, leader in the Portland City league, 5 to 4.

But if one Montavilla base runner on third hadn't been so ambitious and another hadn't been so lacking in enterprise, the story might have been different.

In the eighth inning Strader was on third with one down and Rogoway lifted a high fly to Fleury. Montavilla had just tied the score at four all, and all rules for base runners called for Strader to take a chance and hit for the plate and victory.

Then in the ninth, after Beck had relieved Russell in the box and the Senators had partly pulled themselves out of a bad hole by making a fast double play, and with Garbarino, one of the visitors' heaviest hitters, at bat, McBrice essayed to steal home.

Manager Edwards drew upon himself plenty of wolf howls when he sent Beck in to take Russell's place, but those fans who consider that winning ball games is the sole objective of all baseball strategy, probably have admitted by this time that Edwards was right.

Beck was sent in after two men were on the paths and nobody was out. The fact that an error permitted one of these men to get on base, did not mitigate the seriousness of the crisis.

Russell had been pitching good ball, but it was evident that the Montavillians were getting too familiar with him in the previous inning, when they filled the bases, scored one run, and might have had another except for Strader's failure to run in on the aforementioned outfield fly.

The game was hotly contested from the start, neither team scoring in the first three innings. In the fourth the visitors got a run when Garbarino, was hit by a pitched ball and scored on Strader's long hit. The Senators came back and got three. Hawk singled. Riddings sacrificed him to second. Fleury hit a two bagger scoring Hawk. Gleason beat out a hit to Rogoway. Fleury scoring on Rogoway's wild throw to first. Gill singled to left, putting Gleason on third, and Shackman sacrificed him home.

Montavilla scored again in the fifth on a two bagger by Rogoway and Bemis' single, and in the sixth on a single by Garbarino, a sacrifice by Strader and another single by Misner, tying the score.

In the last half of the sixth, Gleason put the Senators in the lead again with a home run when the bases were empty.

FIGHT POSTPONED ADDING TO PUZZLE

NEW YORK, May 30.—(AP)—The light heavyweight championship battle between Tommy Loughran and Pete Latzo, which was postponed today on account of rain, will be staged next Friday night, June 1, Promoter Humbert J. Fugazy announced tonight.

The postponement was first announced until next Wednesday, but Fugazy decided later to put the show as soon as possible in view of the rapid succession of fights on schedule for the championship.

NEW YORK, May 30.—(AP)—Tommy Loughran's schedule of three light heavyweight title defenses in two weeks, a problem too difficult for the New York boxing commission to solve at one sitting, got out of hand entirely today when rain forced postponement until next Wednesday night of the titleholder's 15 round battle with Pete Latzo, former welterweight champion at Ebbets field.

Loughran was scheduled to open the rapid fire series of 15 round matches tonight and if successful against Latzo, fight Leo Lomski on June 13 and Jimmy Slattery the following night. Now the lineup calls for the Latzo match on June 6 with dates for the second and third frays resting in the hands of the boxing fathers.

The tangle is made more puzzling by a minor battle between Promoters Tex Rickard and Humbert J. Fugazy for Loughran's services. Although the Madison Square Garden impresario holds an option on the champion's services until November 1, the commission sanctioned Tommy's matches with Latzo and Lomski for Fugazy but ordered Tommy to continue his hectic marathon by engaging Slattery for Rickard June 14. The postponement leaves Loughran with three title fights of 15 rounds each during a period of eight days.

23 Year Old Los Angeles Lad Wins Speed Classic

DUNKLEY Associated Press Sports Writer INDIANAPOLIS, May 30.—(AP)—A baby-faced youngster, just 23 years old, Lou Meyer of Los Angeles won the 500 mile automobile race over the Indianapolis motor speedway today, defeating the crack drivers of the nation, while a record breaking crowd of from 135,000 to 150,000 roared their tribute.

The boy from Los Angeles, winning his first major race, rode the entire distance without relief, finishing with a lead of about 2 1/2 miles over Lou Moore, whose car at the finish was being driven by Schneider, relief pilot. George Sonders, former Fordus university student, winner of the 1922 race pulled up in third place about five miles behind Meyer.

Ray Keech of Philadelphia, holder of the world's straightaway record for the mile, was fourth in the show as soon as possible in view of the rapid succession of fights on schedule for the championship.

NEW YORK, May 30.—(AP)—Meyer, bumping over the perilous 2 1/2 mile brick track, making only one stop, covered the distance in 5:01:33.75, averaging 99.482 miles an hour. He stopped once for two minutes and 15 seconds, to take on oil, gas and water.

Meyer's average of 99.482 miles per hour set a new record for the track for motors of 91 cubic inches piston displacement. Pete De Paolo set the track record of 101.13 miles per hour in 1925, with a motor of 122 cubic inches displacement. Last year's time was 97.45 with the same size motor as was permitted today.
