

### FRENCH MAY SELL STAMP COLLECTION

PARIS (AP)—France may sell part of her stamp collection. This is the complete set of postage stamps issued by France since 1848, a collection that covers 80 years. The government mint keeps the rare collection with the old copper plates that made them in a safe that holds the dies for stamping metal money and the official set of platinum weights and measures. There are three keys to the safe, each held by a different official and all necessary for the opening of the big treasure chest. Many issues of the old stamps and often a number of proofs in various colors that were never adopted. Also, there are many foreign stamps, obtained through exchanges with other governments. Mint officials propose putting a complete set in the National Library and selling the remainder, expecting to get big prices.

### TURKEY'S CAPITOL ACQUIRES ELEVATOR

ANGORA, Turkey.—(AP)—The first elevator has been installed in one of the buildings of Turkey's new capital. Thus another red-letter day has been added to the series commemorating the construction of the first new house in the erstwhile village, the first turning the tap of the new water system, the first puff of heat from the first steam radiator and the first switching on of electricity. But the elevator, latest importation from the west, does no elevating as yet, for the minister of hygienic in whose new headquarters it has been installed has not yet been able to find anyone in Angora capable of testing and setting it in motion.

### 100 GRADUATES '78 TO MEET CLASS '28

UNIVERSITY OF OREGON, Eugene, June 2.—(Special)—The 550 members of this year's graduating class of the University of Oregon will be greeted at commencement time, June 8-11, by two members now living who were among the five making up the first graduating class of the University of Oregon in 1878. They are Robert S. Bean, United States district judge, and Mrs. Ellen Condon McCracken, of Eugene. Reunions of three other Oregon classes, the twenty-odd members of the class of 1898, the thirty-members of 1903, and the hundred and fifty members of 1912, are also to be held at commencement time. The reunion of the class of 1902 is perhaps arousing the greatest interest, since it is the 25th anniversary of graduation, and will probably have a larger representation than at any former reunion. Dean James Gilbert, permanent secretary of the class has said that there are only a few members of the class who will not be able to attend the reunion.

### FRENCHMEN FAVOR AMERICANS' MUSIC

PARIS (AP)—Paris audiences are getting a taste for the music of American composers. George Gershwin's "Symphony in Blue" was greeted with great applause and insistent demands for an encore when it was played by the Pasedeloup Orchestra with Gershwin himself in the audience. So successful was Gershwin's music that the orchestra immediately arranged an all-American concert at which compositions by Leo Sowerby, the Chicago composer, Deems Taylor, Charles Griffes, Gershwin and Edward McDowell were played.

### PARIS ADMITS CALL OF BOBBED BANDIT

PARIS.—(AP)—The bobbed-haired bandit came to France two years late. Feminine hold-up and burglary accomplishments are at least one invention which the French will not claim. Georgette Coffinet, aged 16, had made a flying start in the career of crime. She was caught in the act of robbing a small hotel, having gained entrance by crossing a roof and breaking a window. After long interviews with police she admitted several other crimes, including the hold-up of an elderly gentleman who had confided in her. In her bag were found clippings from American and French newspapers, concerning a "bobbed-hair bandit from Brooklyn."
