Interesting Meeting of Salem Garden Club Held Monday Evening

One of the most interesting meetings of the season was held by the Salem Garden club Monday evening in the Chamber of Commerce auditorium.

Mr. Harry L. Pearcy gave a valuable talk on flowering shrubs which he considers more practical in many ways than roses for garden cultivation. He spoke particularly of the trimming of shrubbery which must be done with discretion and with regard to the season of the year and the variety of shrub. Spiraea may be trimmed immediately following the blossoming or even while it is in blossom. Sprays for decorating may be cut so as to trim the plant. Lilacs, according to the speaker, should not be trimmed at all except for the old flowers.

An extensive exhibit of plants suitable for rock gardens was arranged by Ernest Iufer.

Robert Paulus displayed more than 100 beautiful colored slides of flowers from the gardens of Miss Oda Chapman, George Putnam Governor and Mrs. Patterson, Mr. and Mrs. Curtis Cross and Mrs. R. E. Downing.

The club plans to sponsor a flower show in the fall which will be much more elaborate than the show which took place two weeks ago.

Salem's New Memorial Park will be constructed on a lovely rolling tract situated three miles from the heart of Salem; just off the Liberty Road on Browning Avenue. It will be landscaped upon the advice of Prof. Arthur L. Peck of O. S. C. and beautified by modern buildings.

A Memorial Park is a resting place for the departed. But it differs from ordinary cemeteries. Its whole area is beautified as one park. Instead of each small lot commemorating its occupant only, the whole park is dedicated to all. Costly monuments are eliminated. Memorial Parks are being built in almost all progressive cities.

As a whole cemeteries are well named. Cypress Lawn and Riverview are derived from physical characteristics. Other names are taken from associated poetic ideas: Home of Peace, Mt. Hope, Arlington, the National Cemetery, took that name from the original estate of Gen'l. Robert E. Lee's wife. The inspiration of Sleep Hollow at Tarrytown, N. Y., will be apparent. Religious names, classical names, Indian names, all are used.

Your Memorial Park's name should express reverent association with the past and the beauty of the present. "Salem," itself, means peace. The idea of one or two persons are not sufficient. Its name should be the most attractive that all Salem can suggest. For the best name submitted to us under the following conditions, we will pay \$25.

Conditions

1. The name should have dignity, be easily pronounced, sound pleasant, and above all, should not have been frequently used.
2. It must go well as a prefix to the words—Memorial Park.
3. Any resident of Marion or Polk counties not connected, or whose family is not connected, with this Park may submit one name.
4. A short description of the reason your choice is suitable may accompany it, if you desire.
5. With the name submitted enclose your own name and address.
6. In case more than one person selects the name chosen by the judges, the prize will be divided.
7. Names must be submitted by or bear a postmark not later than 11:59 P. M. Saturday, June 10th.
8. After the names not conforming to conditions 1 and 2 have been eliminated, final selection will be made by our Advisory Board consisting of: DAN'L J. FRY, GEORGE VICK, PERCY CUPPER, JAS. H. NICHOLSON, W. S. LEVENS.
9. The winner of the contest will be notified and announced on Wednesday, June 14th.
