Reports of State Convention Given at Business Meeting of B and P. W. Club

Reports of the state convention of Business and Professional Women's clubs held at Roseburg, May 19, 19 and 20 were given at the business meeting of the local B and P. W. club Wednesday evening at the Gray Belle, by the following delegates and alternates: Mona Yoder, Laura Templeton, Grace Sehon, Maude Pointer, May Cleveland, Ruth McAdams, Josephine Shade, and Phoebe McAdams. Grace Sehon spoke of the breakfast served at the Roseburg country club in honor of officers, delegates and visiting club women. The Indian motif was carried on in the serving and decorations. Guests were met at the door and given Indian head bands. Mrs. Sehon also mentioned the profusion of flowers in blossom there. The banquet which was held Saturday evening at the First Methodist church was described by Maude Pointer. Club songs were featured in the early part of the evening. "My Old Kentucky Home" was sung by all clubs in honor of Miss Lena Madeline Phillips, national president whose home is in that state and who was a special guest at the convention. Introduction of past presidents and national officers in attendance concluded the evening. Phlox, sweet peas, and sweet rocket, in combination with tall yellow tapers were arranged on long banquet tables. Stunts given by the club were reviewed by May Cleveland, each club having endeavored to advertise the outstanding industry of its community in this manner. Josephine Shade gave her impressions of Miss Phillips, whom she says has a very charming personality and a super-abundance of energy and enthusiasm. Salem Contractor Who Died Suddenly June 6 to be Buried Today

Charles T. McIntire died suddenly at his residence, 140 Superior street, at 2:30 o'clock June 6. Funeral services will be held at the Clough-Huston mortuary at 2:30 o'clock this afternoon.

Charles McIntire was born at Falls City, Neb., February 4, 1858. His parents crossed the plains when he was two and a half years old, locating in the Oregon territory. Charles McIntire resided near Salem until 37 years of age. He married Adda F. Thompson and they moved to Salem where for 30 years the residence was maintained.

Mr. McIntire's early life was devoted to farming, but since coming to Salem he conducted a general contracting and building business.

Mr. McIntire was a charter member of the Woodmen of the World and the services at the Clough-Huston cemetery will be directed by that order.

He is survived by his widow, Adda F.; three sons, Ross T. of Washington D. C., Floyd F. of New York City and Harold T. of San Diego, Calif.; two daughters, Mrs. A. N. Davis of Miami, Florida, and Mrs. D. B. Dodd of San Francisco, Calif.; two grandchildren, Jean and Anne David; three nephews, Roy and Fred McIntire of Salem and Frank Harritt of Eugene; two nieces, Mrs. Myrtle Lawrence of Salem and Mrs. Guy Newgent of West Salem.
