Program for Fourth of July Event Includes Many Features

SILVERTON, June 8.—(Special.)—Seven committees of the local fire fighters are already busy at work promulgating a gigantic Fourth of July celebration for Silverton.

The day will get under way with a huge parade, which leaves the armory at 10 o'clock, with the 4-L band providing the music. The parade committee has set aside \$50 for prizes, with floats to be graded on a number of bases, including originality and beauty, humor or advertising. Many civic entries are assured.

A good program of sports, both on land and water, is planned and will be one of the main events of the day. There will be a baseball game between Silverton and North Lowell.

Reverend Foss will be the principal speaker of the afternoon program, starting at 1 o'clock in the beautiful Silverton park.

Dancing in the park during the afternoon and in the evening at the armory will be another popular feature.

Dean's First Annual Report Says Need of Point System

The report of the dean's first year's activity at the senior high school has been submitted to superintendent George W. Hug and shows constructive work undertaken during the year as well as a number of recommendations to expedite the work next year.

A survey of the 642 girls in the senior high was made and results filed in "case" cards. The survey showed 43 girls to be living away from home with 25 working for their room and board, 20 of whom were entirely self-supporting. Compensation ranged from \$6 to \$12 a month, with hours of service anywhere between four and eight, showing several of the girls were overworked for one who is going to school and still in adolescence. Or the girls working, several were "A" students, but so fatigued with home duties they could barely make a passing grade in their school classes.

Next year an attempt will be made to remedy this condition, with five hours as the maximum of work on school days. Girls not living at home must have their residence approved by the dean, who will attempt to see that each is placed in a home suitable to her needs and capabilities, the report states.

The scholarship problem, while not entirely separable from health and social adjustment, was also handled by the dean, who endeavored to find the difficulty as teachers reported unsatisfactory work to her. In cases where low scholarship was attributable to outside influences, parents were called into conference. Next year Dean Robertson plans to have teachers send her "poor work" slips at the end of the first three weeks of each term in order that unsatisfactory work may be checked before the end of the term. This will probably prevent numerous term failures. Poor physical condition has also been responsible for failures, the report observes and commends the work of the Marion county health demonstration in its aid in locating such defects which, when improved, resulted in better grades.

On the side of social adjustment, one of the main interests of the teachers, clubs were encouraged to provide the student with purposeful activity, and with the revised program of next year, greater progress in this work is anticipated. The report states that 77 girls withdrew from school during the year, or nearly a 12 percent waste. This is often traceable to maladjustment on the part of students coming from a smaller school. In November the girls' league was formed to help remedy the problems of adjustment and

ANNUAL AIR CIRCUS NEXT AT SILVERTON

American Legion Sponsoring Unique Event, to Occur June 24

SILVERTON, June 8.—(Special.)—Sunday, June 24, will mark Silverton's second annual air circus, when aviators from every part of the state will be guests of Silverton. The American Legion is sponsoring the affair, assisted by civic bodies.

Planes of all descriptions and types, with parachute jumps, wing walking, races and possible cross country races furnishing thrills for the spectators. Passenger planes will, of course, be on hand to make short trips around Silverton.

The first circus, a surprising success, was held a year ago on leased land.

The Silverton flying field is three-fourths of a mile north of town, near the Pacific highway. It is 1800 by 2100 feet and parallels the Silverton-Salem highway. Runways are 2500 by 2700 feet long. The field is in excellent condition, grass heavily covered the field, insuring the aerial observers against a wreck. A hangar 85 by 30, large enough to accommodate two planes has been erected, with machine shops and office room. A 60-foot driveway to the field was made and graveled.

AUTO CRASHES POLE
