Labor Has Surplus—A total of 329 men and women sought work through the federal employment bureau the past week, reports Slim Phillips, manager. But 289 calls for assistance came in, most of which were for agricultural helpers, including 148 men and 48 women. Only ten of the men and five of the women registered for this work were unemployed at the end of the week. Other workers placed included: 16 farm hands; 7 casual workers; 6 woodsmen (12 were wanted); two carpenters; three painters; one truck driver; three women kitchen workers; six housekeepers and seven cooks.
