MISFIT ROOM AT LESLIE HAS INTERESTING YEAR

In the special room for misfit pupils at Leslie Junior high the past year some very good work was done and is outlined in a brief report of the instructor, E. Gertrude Anderson. More handicraft equipment would facilitate the work of this room, Mrs. LaMoine R. Clark, principal, noted on the report sent to the city superintendent.

One accomplishment was influencing the children to read good stories for themselves, as at first most of them would only glance at the pictures. Children in the room used many books from the city library before the year was finished.

Several projects were carried on, including a miniature store used for the teaching of arithmetic and also geography as the children

learned where the food products used came from.

Stories read were dramatized. The pupils quickly accepted the Saly maps of the United States and took keen delight in locating the states by shape and position.

The children learned to make articles that would be useful to them in their homes, the period after completion of the regular work being daily devoted to this.

One girl from the special room went into regular work at the middle of the year and three have been recommended for return to regular classes for the following year.
