## MANHATTAN PLAYERS TO GIVE 'THE PUSH'

J. Burt Burton of the Manhattan Players in speaking of the play to be presented today and Saturday at the Elsinore, said, "One of the greatest difficulties we experience today is in securing good, clean comedy plays that have a sufficient degree of original and spontaneous comedy. This play, 'The Push,' is one of the best comedies we have been able to secure in the past year. It was just released and we were one of the first to secure a production lease of the play. Charles F. Harrison, the author of 'The Push,' has never set Broadway wild with any of his plays, and yet he is accredited with having written some of the best plays of late years and many of these have been seen in practically every city outside of New York. He wrote 'Sainted Hypocrites and Honest Sinners,' 'The Only State of Melancholy,' 'The People's Business,' and undoubtedly some of these have been seen in this city. ## FRANKLIN TO TOUR ORIENT WITH CLOSE

Willamette Professor to Spend Ten Weeks Studying Social Conditions

On Sunday morning Dr. Frank G. Franklin of Willamette University will sail from Seattle for a ten weeks' tour of the Orient. The tour is under the direction of Dr. Josef Washington Hall, better known as Upton Close, of the department of sociology of the University of Washington. There will be 45 in the party.

The party will first go to Japan where two weeks will be spent in studying various social conditions. From Japan the party will go to Shanghai, then to northern China, inland to Manchuria and finally to Korea.

Throughout the Oriental tour the party will use native means of transportation, and has been warned to be prepared for many kinds of inconveniences.

Mr. Close made a similar trip last summer with a group of six University of Washington men, and the tour this year is being directed in such a manner that the party may best see a cross-section of Oriental life as Mr. Close found it on his previous journey.

The party will keep out of the Chinese war zone, will make an attempt to get a first hand view of actual living conditions of Oriental people. The trip will not resemble the ordinary tourist journey at all.

## 49 TEACHERS WRITE LARGEST NUMBER IN SOME TIME; GRAMMAR TEST LONG

Exactly 49 men and women who wish to teach in Marion county next year were writing on one or more of the state teachers' examinations yesterday, reports County Superintendent Fulkerson.

This number is the largest that has gathered since the new law requiring one year of Normal work teaching at least into effect. Three years ago 93 teachers wrote. Superintendent Fulkerson looks for only a dozen or 15 to appear for the examinations in December, due to the fact that most teachers will be busy teaching then and not worrying about a future year.

Today is the last day those who are seeking one and five year certificates will write. Saturday only those who are taking the life examinations will be in attendance. One man has been writing on all examinations to secure this certificate, and at least two others are expected to appear on Saturday.

Two of the examinations given yesterday were grammar and geography. The former was one of the longest tests, with 10 questions and half with small printed matter and including nearly a hundred distinct parts. Verb forms, principal parts, selection of verbals in sentences, singular and possessive of nouns, adjectives and adverbs, prepositions, verb and noun constructions, kinds of sentences classified as to meaning and structure, pronouns, composition and letter writing were the theme of some of the major questions.

But one of the geography questions was on the United States.
