COLORADO EXPECTS MILLION TOURISTS

DENVER.—(AP)—The summer influx of tourists to Colorado, land of perpetual snow and almost perpetual sunshine, is under way, and the Denver tourist bureau expects the number to reach 1,000,000 before the summer ends.

The number of visitors who came last year has been estimated at 700,000. The amount of money they spent in Colorado has been estimated at \$45,000,000.

This year the tourist bureau predicts the revenue will reach \$60,000,000. The 1927 season did not measure up to expectations because of cool weather throughout the summer in neighboring states.

CATTLE SUPPLANT HORSES ON PLAINS

SANTA FE, N. M.—(AP)—The broomtail pony and the wild burro are vanishing rapidly from the western plains.

Conservation of grass is a rule adopted generally by stockmen at the suggestion of bankers and professors at agricultural colleges who have studied the problem of making semi-arid land produce an income.

Inauguration of the policy of economy was the death knell for great numbers of wild horses and burros. The automobile, truck and tractor have displaced the horse and the mule to a large extent on the farms and ranches. Many horses have been turned loose on the open ranges. They have multiplied rapidly, but the stock deteriorated. No ranchman bothered about branding the colts, because he did not want to pay taxes on animals having little market value.

They were nobody's horses, worth very little, but eating grass which would feed somebody's valuable cattle.

Montana was the first state to legislate against "abandoned" horses. Its law requiring their roundup and sale was taken as an example by the last Wyoming legislature. Now the New Mexico Cattle and Horse Growers association wants a law which will clear the ranges in this state of such animals.

But the wild horses and burros are being rounded up in New Mexico, Texas and Colorado, as well as Wyoming and Montana. They are driven to "reduction plants" and sold for \$2 to \$10 a head. The animals are slaughtered, their hides sold to tanners, the meat and bones made into chicken feed and fertilizer and the fat utilized for soap.

And the land which supported almost worthless beasts is turned over to cattle worth at least \$50 a head.
