

RAINBOW ASSEMBLY DELEGATES ARRIVE

Chadwick Group Hostess to
Several Hundred Girls
From Over State

The Oregon grand assembly of the order of the Rainbow girls will convene in Salem this morning for a two day session. Chadwick assembly No. 3, Salem Rainbow girls, has made preparations to entertain several hundred Rainbow girls from all parts of Oregon.

Among the visiting groups will be assembly delegates from Portland, Rainier, Eugene, Albany, The Dalles, St. Helens, La Grande, Dallas, McMinnville, Corvallis, Nehalem, Woodburn, Newberg, and Vernonia.

A special train will bring a large portion of the northern delegations, arriving in Salem at 10 o'clock this morning.

The first session of Grand assembly will be held at 1 o'clock, in the Masonic temple. Tomorrow's program includes a trip through scenic grounds about Salem and a closing banquet at the Court street Christian church in the evening.

Billie Cupper is advisor of the local assembly, with Mrs. David Wright the mother advisor. The Rainbow girls of Chadwick assembly are being assisted in the grand assembly affair by the mother group, Chadwick chapter, Order of the Eastern Star.

NEW COMMODITIES INCLUDE CURRANT

Large cherry currants appeared on the local markets this week for the first time this season, and are selling wholesale at \$2 per 24 crate, report local distributors.

The vanguard of the California black figs have also reached here, an extra fancy pack eight-pound tray being quoted at \$1.50 in Salem. Portland is quoting the same commodity 25 cents higher.

Klondike watermelons, those of the black seeds, are fine quality, crisp and sweet, and are 4 1/2 cents.

Imperial valley cantaloupes are also cheaper this week, moving rapidly at from \$2.50 to \$3.50 per crate according to size.

The peak of the strawberry season has passed, although a considerable tonnage of berries are yet to be handled by the local canneries. The present wholesale quotation is around \$1.35 per crate a slight raise.

California apricots, extra good quality, are quoted at \$1.50 per 20-pound lug.

California Triumph peaches well colored and juicy, are coming at \$1.75 per box.

The plums now on the market from California, are exceptionally fine and are moving rapidly at \$1.50 and \$2.00 per box.

The Dalles green beans are on the Salem markets in limited quantities, billed at 15 cents, with the wax beans quoted a cent higher. These are fine varieties.

The local green pea supply has been limited this week, causing wholesalers to ship peas in from The Dalles to meet the demand. The Telephone variety is billed at seven cents, and moving rapidly.

Lemons have taken a turn for the cheaper, with the better sized, and fancy packs at from \$3.25 to \$3.75 per case.

Local rhubarb is almost a thing of the past, with scarcely any demand as berries and other fresh fruits have taken its place.

Growers and jobbers are both cleaning up their stocks of old spuds in preparation for the new crop, and consequently the old potatoes are quoted at reasonable figures.

Local hot house tomatoes have undergone a decided decline, now being billed at \$4 on the extra fancy pack.

Local Lake Labish onions are anywhere from \$3 to \$3.50, with the California red and yellows still around \$2.25 per hundred.

Present crop of local lettuce is nearing the end of the supply; quality is good, and now quoted at \$1.75 per crate.

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WANT MORE MONEY BAPTIST MISSIONARY PROGRAM DECLARED IN NEED

DETROIT, June 21.—(AP)—The necessity of more generous financial support of the Baptist missionary program was emphasized today in the annual report of the board of missionary cooperation to the Northern Baptist convention.

The report, submitted by Dr. W. H. Bowler, of New York, executive secretary of the board, pointed out that although contributions to missionary work increased nearly \$600,000, during the last year, over the preceding year, the amount was \$1,450,000 short of the budget.

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SENTENCED TO PEN

LOS ANGELES BANKER AND ATTORNEY GET TERMS

SAN FRANCISCO, June 21.—(AP)—J. W. Randolph, Los Angeles broker facing trial on a charge of murdering his wife, Samuel H. Robinson, Los Angeles attorney, and Harry Kasmir, of San Francisco, were today convicted of using the mails to defraud, and sentenced to terms in the federal penitentiary.

Kasmir, convicted on 36 counts, was fined \$1,000 and sentenced to five years in prison on each count, the terms to run concurrently. Randolph, also convicted on 36 counts, was fined \$1,000 and sentenced to four years in the prison on each count, the terms to run concurrently.

Robinson, convicted on 12 counts, was sentenced to a year and a day on each count, the terms to run concurrently.

He expects to see a good show at Houston, however, at the end of which he will return with the delegation from South Dakota and spend a few weeks visiting old time friends at his former home near Aberdeen, where he resided for many years before coming to Salem.

Mrs. Powers will accompany him to South Dakota and they expect to return to Salem during the latter part of July.

Latin-American Asked To Conciliation Meeting

WASHINGTON, June 21.—(AP)—Secretary Kellogg announced today that he had invited all the Latin-American republics to participate in a conference on conciliation and arbitration to be held in Washington on December 10.

At the same time he made public that he and former Secretary of State Charles Evans Hughes would represent the United States at the conference.

Three more deaths and millions of dollars of property damage were added today to the toll taken by storms in the southwest since last Saturday.

Tornadoes again visited communities in Oklahoma, and high winds, floods and hail scattered destruction in sections of Kansas and Missouri.

The three deaths reported today brought the total dead to 12 and more than a score of names were added to the long list of injured.

Red Cross reported 2,200 persons homeless, many of them destitute, in the four counties around Altus, Okla., where a tornado struck Saturday night. Damage in this section was placed at \$1,500,000 and the Red Cross officials announced that \$30,000 would be needed for emergency relief work.

Harry Guggenheim Puts Up Fund to Teach Flying

NEW YORK, June 21.—(AP)—Appropriations totaling \$319,000 for research work in connection with aviation in three educational institutions, were announced today by Harry F. Guggenheim, president of the Daniel Guggenheim Fund for the Promotion of Aeronautics.
