

Senators Blank Cottage Grove 14 to 0; Beck Allows But Three Hits

If, next Sunday at Bend, Johnny Beck can be inveigled into the same frame of mind with which he tackled the job of setting down the Cottage Grove team yesterday, the Salem Senators' chances to win the first half pennant in the Willamette Valley league will not be so dismal as they have appeared for the last week.

Beck allowed the Lane county boys only three hits, and that was just about the steepest pitching that has been done in this man's league all season. It's been beaten only once, when the Senators themselves were the victims of Bill Baker's pitching at Eugene.

The Senators won 14 to 0, and the many regular fans who stayed away missed a nice ball game, in spite of the score.

Just as he did against Bend a week before, Smith of Cottage Grove pitched nice ball for five innings and then weakened. Up to that time the Senators had scored three runs, two in the first and one in the third inning, and had amassed six hits, one of them Riddings' homer in the third.

In the sixth a two bagger by Riddings and a homer by Sullivan started the fireworks, and two more runs were scored when Hawk was hit by a pitched ball, Olinger singled, Hawk sprinting around to third, Edwards sacrificed Hawk in and advanced Olinger to second and Beck singled to score Olinger.

Hubbell, who was Cottage Grove's regular moundsman up to a week ago, took Smith's place in the seventh and was hit hard in addition to being disastrously wild. He hit two batsmen, walked three and allowed four hits in two innings. At that, only four of the seven runs made off him were earned. Three came after an error that on a play should have counted for the last out in the seventh.

The way that Beck mowed down the Cottage Grove batsmen was nothing less than shameful. Only six of them got on the paths. Dutton opened the game with a single and advanced when Hill walked, but a double play stopped that threat. In the fourth Gordon Riddings was hit by a pitched ball and Orr singled. In the seventh Orr singled again and Brauner walked. In the other six innings the visitors went out one-two-three. Beck struck out 11 of them. Earl Hill, Cottage Grove's demon slugger, struck out twice and failed to get a single.

FLOOD CONTROL WANTED FOR WILLAMETTE RIVER

not provide for the control of floods in the Columbia and Willamette rivers as it does for the Mississippi and Sacramento rivers or any river whose flood waters do damage to public and private property. BRITISHER DEFEATS FRANCIS T. HUNTER

WIMBLEDON, England, June 25.—(AP)—America's invading tennis stars bidding for the English championship lost one of their toughest warriors in the opening round of play today when Francis T. Hunter was eliminated by Young Ed Andrews of New Zealand, a student at Cambridge, 6-4, 5-7, 6-4, 2-6, 7-5.

All the other seeded players including William T. Tilden, John Hennessey and the French "three musketeers" came through the first round with comparative ease as did America's younger stars.

The totally unexpected defeat of Hunter stood out as the dramatic high spot of the day.

Although only 22 and comparatively inexperienced in international play, "Buster" Andrews who holds the championship of New Zealand, played brilliantly, proving particularly devastating at the net. Hunter called into use every ounce of his great strength on every stroke and every trick of court strategy, flashing his red-strung racket with all the skill he could command, but the young New Zealander seemed to bear a charmed existence.

Hunter's American Davis cup team mates all came safely through their first matches, Tilden scoring a smashing victory over M. V. Summerson, youthful English player, 6-0, 6-1, 6-0. Hennessey downed E. Mather, English entrant, 6-1, 6-0, 6-2, and George Lott was not extended in winning from the middle aged London doctor, F. Crosbie, 6-2, 6-0, 6-0.

Wilbur F. Coen, 16 year old member of the American team, had a hard assignment in encountering the Danish Davis cup player, Alex Petersen, but won by scores of 7-5, 6-3, 6-3.

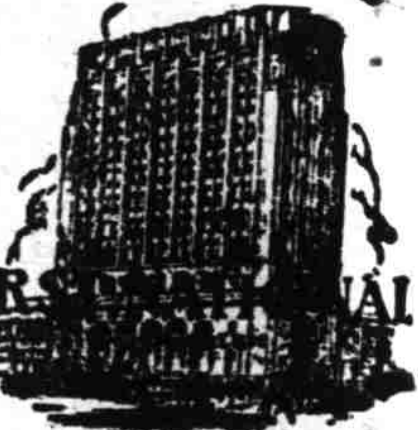
plank was forthcoming. It would declare for unequivocal endorsement of the 18th amendment and oppose any "attempt to repeal it or destroy the prohibition laws."
