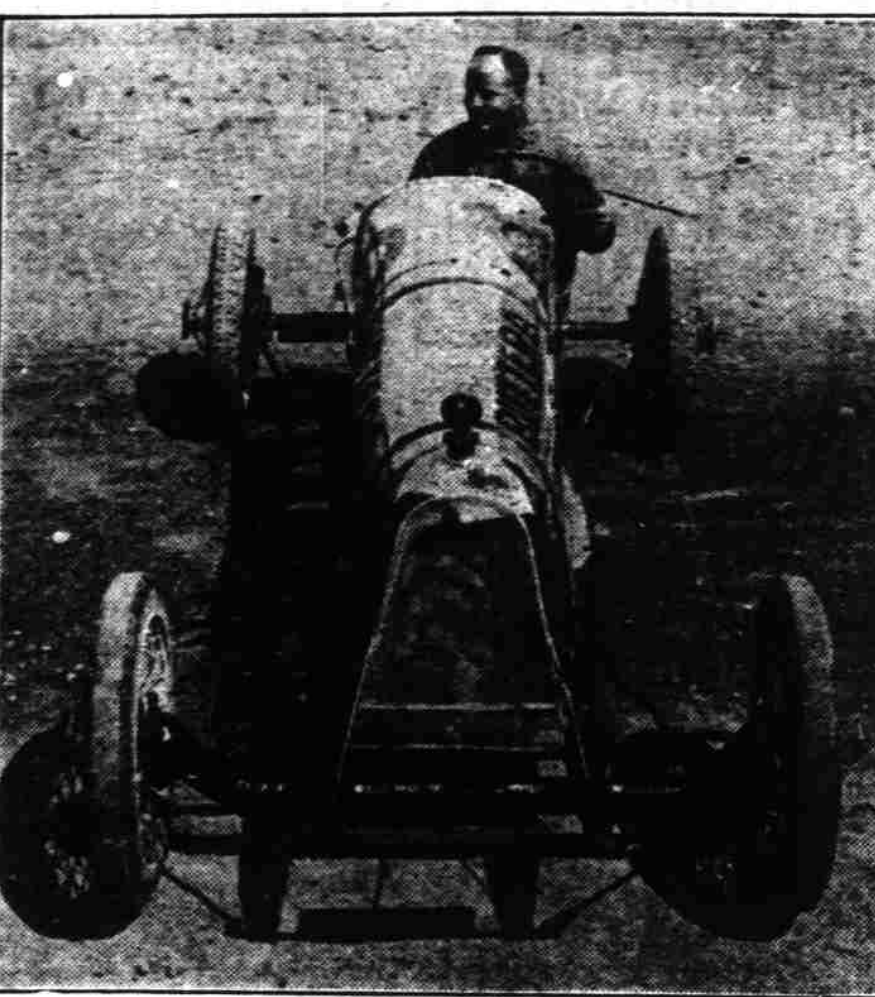

CZECHS' MEMORIAL TO HONOR WILSON

BOSTON, (AP).—Evidence that Czechoslovakia has not forgotten America and her benefactor, Woodrow Wilson, is found by Rev. John S. Porter of the American Board of Commissioners for Foreign Missions in the fact that a memorial dedicated to America's war-time president soon will be dedicated in Prague.

Mr. Porter, since 1891 a worker under the board in Prague, writes: "On July 4 a monument to Woodrow Wilson will be unveiled in front of the principal railway station of Prague, which has borne the name of Wilson Station for the past ten years. This year we are celebrating the tenth anniversary of the Czechoslovak Republic. Many Czechs are coming from America and elsewhere to participate."

Porter, only representative of the American board in Czechoslovakia, points out that the street on which Wilson Station is located is called Hoover street, named, he explains, "after our American Hoover."

The field of this American Mission is a wide one, with 31 organized churches and more than 150 places where regular Christian services are held.

ITALIA BURNED AFTER WRECK NOBILE STATES

(Continued from page 1.) that the distance can be spanned in two hours or less by plane. Many Still Missing Fifteen or sixteen men remain to be found or brought back to civilization.

When General Nobile was taken from his camp he left five companions behind but this party was again raised to six when Lieutenant E. Lundborg who brought the general, was himself marooned by a crash on his second attempt to land on the floe.

The lieutenant has been trying to repair his machine but has called for spare parts to be lowered to him by parachute. A Swedish mechanic who thinks he can hurry the repair work, has asked permission to attempt a landing by parachute. His superiors are a bit doubtful about his scheme as any mistake would result only in another injured person for them to save.

Ten More Sought Besides this half dozen near Foyno island, account is sought for 10 others of the crew of the Italia. Three of these started to walk to land from Nobile's camp on May 30, several days before radio communication was established with Kings Bay.

Seven other members of the Italia crew were carried away when the bag of the Italia bounded into arctic murk after the gondola with Nobile and his party was torn loose. There may be only six of these surviving. A seemingly well founded report is current that Vincenzo Pomella, motor attendant, was thrown from the forward compartment and killed. Actual confirmation of this is lacking.

The rescuers and arctic experts still are hoping that trace will be found of Roald Amundsen and the five men with him in the big Latham French seaplane.
