While in Louisville she also visited the city hospital and made several trips around the city and through the beautiful parks. Visits to Lincoln's home and the house where "My Old Kentucky Home" was written were included in this itinerary.

Miss Taylor spent some time in Buffalo visiting friends. The Buffalo general hospital was visited and a day spent at Niagara Falls on this part of the trip.

From New York the local nurse went to Ridgeway, Ontario, where she visited with Mrs. John Spence, formerly Miss Josephine Cuyler who is a graduate nurse and formerly lived in Salem.

In Chicago Miss Taylor visited with Miss Astrid Hofseth, formerly superintendent of the Salem General hospital and together they visited the Illinois training school where particular attention was paid to the records and the new children's department. Among the other hospitals visited in that city were the Presbyterian, Evans-ton and Augustina, which all have nurses' schools.

From Illinois, Miss Taylor journeyed to southern Wisconsin where she visited a sister and nephew after which the return trip was made over the Canadian Pacific through Victoria and Vancouver, B. C.

A great deal of rain was encountered on the trip, and though Miss Taylor visited and passed through much beautiful country, she is satisfied there is no place like Oregon.

## GET MINOR INJURIES IN AUTO ACCIDENT

TURNER, June 29.—(Special) —A local nurse, responsible for the care of a patient, and a considerable number of touring cars in an automobile accident on the highway between the Scott Funston and C. A. Bear ranches.

## FORM SAVES MONEY ON CANAL SHIPPING

BALBOA, Canal Zone, June 29.—(AP)—Institution of a new standard form of steamship bill of lading for the Panama Canal, announced for Canal Zone ports by Dr. J. D. Long, chief quarantine officer, is expected to save shipping companies thousands of dollars annually.

By the use of the new forms, ships which are granted the bill of lading may enter any port in the United States or its possessions without inspection there, provided they have not touched at any foreign port prior to arrival here or will not touch at a foreign port before arrival at the port of destination in the United States.

The blanks for the bill of health were prepared in accordance with the standard form which was agreed upon by 18 nations of the

Pan-American Union through a treaty known as the sanitary code. It is expected that the new forms will affect approximately 40 percent of the shipping through the Panama Canal. Practically all of the coast to coast shipping will be interested in this and direct line steamers from the Canal Zone to ports in the United States also will be affected. It will mean that many hours of waiting outside busy ports will be eliminated and that thousands of dollars thus saved by shipping firms that operate ships between ports in the United States.

An example of how the new regulation will operate is shown by a ship making a voyage from New York to San Francisco. Upon its arrival here it will be examined and if satisfactory will be given a standard form bill of health. Upon its arrival in San Francisco it will be able to dock at once without quarantine officers there boarding her, thereby frequently saving many hours.

## RAINS TOURISTS IN

## FRANCE NOW BANS EASY MARRIAGES

PARIS, June 29.—(AP)—Simultaneously with the tightening of the regulations covering the divorcing of foreigners by the French courts, the ministry of justice has issued instructions that greater attention must be paid to marriage laws.

This is proving somewhat costly to American lawyers in Paris and on the Riviera who have made a specialty of handling all the details of a French civil marriage on brief notice. In many cases which have been brought to the attention of the "procureur general," the necessary bans apparently have never been published, birth certificates have not been provided and in the case of divorced persons the extracts of the divorce court's decree have not been filed.

At considerable cost to clients lawyers have had marriages performed within 24 hours after the arrival of the parties in France, whereas the law calls for residence of 21 days and at least eight days open publication of bans.

Mayors have now been advised that all marriage returns are to be closely reviewed and in cases where the law has not been complied with the right of the ministry of justice to annul marriages will be exercised.

## Gilbert Plays Dual Role in Fox Picture

Called upon to play the dual role of twin brothers, physically alike, but otherwise totally different, John Gilbert, the hero of Fox films reissue, "Honor First," found a task to his liking. The finished work will be shown at the Capitol today.

Renée Adoree, beautiful star of many notable pictures, has the leading feminine role as a Parisian girl loved by a soldier of France during the early stages of the World War.

Gilbert appears in the role of the heroic fighting man, whose brother, a duplicate in appearance, is a coward and a renegade. It also falls upon Gilbert to play the latter role, so that he is required to present two characters of directly opposite type.

## Portland Woman May Die As Result of Auto Crash

PORTLAND, June 29.—(AP)—When Mrs. E. E. Gray, 39, attempted to leave the automobile driven by her husband on the Columbia highway east of Portland today, she was thrown to the pavement and received injuries which may cause her death. At a hospital here tonight she was believed to be suffering from a fractured skull. Traffic accident investigators said they learned the woman was having a slight altercation with her husband, who was driving about 20 miles an hour when the accident occurred.

## WOMAN WILL CROSS SEA BY MOTORBOAT

Marion Carstairs Plans Trip to U. S. To Enter Races At Detroit

By DOROTHY RUSSELL (Associated Press Staff Writer) COWES, Isle of Wight, June 29.—(AP)—Marion Carstairs is so certain she can cross the ocean in a motor boat and then win back the Harmsworth Trophy for England at the races in Detroit that she is spending some \$250,000 of her own money on the two projects.

The money is part of the fortune inherited from her mother who was Frances Estelle Bostwick, daughter of Jabez Abel Bostwick of New York, a founder of the Standard Oil company.

The adventure, she is sure, is worth the price. "I haven't been to America since 1916 and I am eager to see it all again," she says. "And I am looking forward to visiting Detroit, which I have never seen, although I was brought up in the United States."

"I am convinced that the voyage can be made in a motor boat, but of course it must be especially constructed. It will have to be a covered boat and much larger and stronger than a fresh water racing boat."

Although Miss Carstairs will not commit herself as to the expected speed of her "cockleshell liner," it is understood that it will average between 40 and 50 miles an hour in fair weather. The crossing, it is said, will take less than three days. Experts here point out, however, that 25 to 30 miles an hour would be the highest speed maintainable in a stormy sea.

The super motor boat is completely covered. Wireless will be carried, and there will be a crew of six, including Miss Carstairs, two mechanics, a wireless operator and Joe Harris, Miss Carstairs' own engineer and right-hand man, her shipmate in all her races. A special system of ventilation will enable the crew to be comfortable even in proximity to the engines.

Miss Carstairs is the first challenger Great Britain has had in the Harmsworth Cup speed boat classic since Gar Wood won the trophy at Cowes with "Miss America" in 1920. She shares honors with Sir Thomas Lipton as the greatest sports enthusiast who has attempted to recapture a boating honor from America in recent years.

She is called here "half-American," but she isn't. She is 95 percent Yankee. The remaining five percent is just enough to enable her to carry a British passport and to fly the Union Jack on the three challenge boats, Estelle I, II and III, one of which she will pilot in the Detroit River race in September.

"Joe" Carstairs—she repudiates the nickname "Betty" as being utterly inappropriate—is made of the stuff reserved for adventure. One glance at her handsome face, tanned by the sea and whipped into bloom by wind and salt sea spray, convinces you of it. There is a bit of the dare-devil in the frank straight look of her brown eyes and the determined set of her firm chin and laughing mouth.

Here in a locked and closely shed, the high speed motor boat, specially designed to cross the Atlantic, is nearing completion in greatest secrecy. She expects to smash all trans-Atlantic ocean records for crossing the ocean.

All Miss Carstairs' craft carry Napier Lion engines of the type used in the British aircraft which won the Schneider Cup at Venice last year, and which was fitted in Captain Malcolm Campbell's car when he set his automobile speed record at Daytona Beach. These engines cost about \$10,000 each and are extremely difficult to obtain, as they are controlled by the British government.

## SKELETON'S PRANK CHOPIN INSPIRATION

Funeral March by Famed Musician Said Caused by Unique Trick

BERLIN, June 29.—(AP)—The dramatic circumstances under which Chopin was inspired to compose the Funeral March of his Sonata in B minor are recounted in Ernst Decsey's collection of musicians' anecdotes, "Die Spieluhr" (The Music Box).

Adolph Ziem, the painter, had decided to present his admired friend, Chopin, with a new grand piano and for that purpose invited the master to dinner, together with two other Parisian artists, Prince Polignac and the painter Ricard. Chopin arrived late, as ever, after dark. As he seemed more depressed than usual, the three jolly Bohemians tried to cheer him up by playing one prank after another.

Finally Polignac conceived the grotesque idea of dragging a human skeleton from the adjoining studio and with ludicrous ceremony seating it at the pianoforte. He grasped the bony hands and ran them over the keys, now softly then louder. The others extinguished the candles and listened to the gruesome performance in breathless silence.

Suddenly three dull blows reverberated through the darkness.

Ricard had perpetrated the lurk joke of kicking the chest on which he sat. While the others laughed to ease the nervous tension, Chopin dashed to the piano and dragged from the chair the skeleton, which he passionately embraced. He then sat down and began to play without his friends remarking that it was he. The sadness and sweetness of the music gripped the three friends. Abruptly the flow of melody ceased with a glaring dissonance. The three friends rushed to the piano and picked up Chopin, who had fallen from the chair in a swoon.

When several months later Chopin played his B minor sonata for the first time in public the third movement contained the improvisation heard in Ziem's studio that eventful night. And the first person to be carried to his grave to the strains of this march funereal was—Chopin.

## HUMAN FLY ARRIVES

J. J. WOODS WILL SCALE SENATOR HOTEL TODAY

The "human fly" is with us. If you have never seen a "human fly," today will be your chance.

J. J. Woods, who has the unique name, is going to put on two exhibitions today to show the public what a human fly can do. He will climb the four story Senator hotel building, at 2:30 o'clock this afternoon, and again at 7:30 o'clock in the evening.

His evening performance will be done blindfolded. Woods' specialty is vertical progress. Recently he climbed the 15 story Los Angeles Pacific National bank building in Fresno, Cal.

He has never failed yet, he reports. He relies on splendid development in the fingers and forearm muscles to do his unusual feats.

Buildings from five to 25 stories high have been climbed by "fly."

Woods has been in this work for 13 years and says that he is not a bit superstitious about that 13th year. He used to do vaudeville work exclusively, but later branched out into the more spectacular "human fly" role. He has been in every state in the union. His outdoor stunt here is in connection with his appearances on the stage at the Oregon theater in a physical culture act which is in itself of educational value as well as unusually interesting as entertainment. He will be on the program at the matinee and also this evening.

## Electric Wire Kills Man At Oregon City Yesterday

OREGON CITY, June 29.—(AP)—William Moritz, 40, electrician for the Crown Williamette Paper company for the past eight years, was fatally burned today at the company's plant at West Linn, when a flash of electricity set fire to his clothing as Moritz turned on the switch for operating machinery.

Two workmen rushed to Moritz' assistance, and after extinguishing the flames, carried him to the first aid room in the mill. He was taken to a hospital where he died.

## OLD PIONEERS HOLD PORTLAND MEETING

Early Days Recalled by Many Gathering at 56th Annual Reunion

PORTLAND, June 29.—(AP)—Days when the Oregon country was a wilderness inhabited by savages, when the ox team and the covered wagon formed the principal means of travel, and when a man's life often depended on his ability to shoot straight, were recalled when a group of hardy Oregonians and their descendants gathered here yesterday.

It was the 56th annual reunion of the Oregon Pioneer association and many of those men and women who were responsible for the beginnings of this state, who founded Oregon's cities, and carved their farms from the forests, were assembled to talk over old times and pay respects to those of their numbers who had answered the roll call of death during the past year.

Mrs. O. N. Denny, 91, a survivor of the Whitman massacre, was crowned "Mother Queen" of the gathering. Mrs. Mary Barlow Wilkins, past president of the pioneer association, placed the crown of roses on the brow of the woman who had been identified with Pacific northwest history for 81 years.

Miss Anne Whiteaker of Eugene, daughter of John Whiteaker, first governor of Oregon was presented to the assembly.
