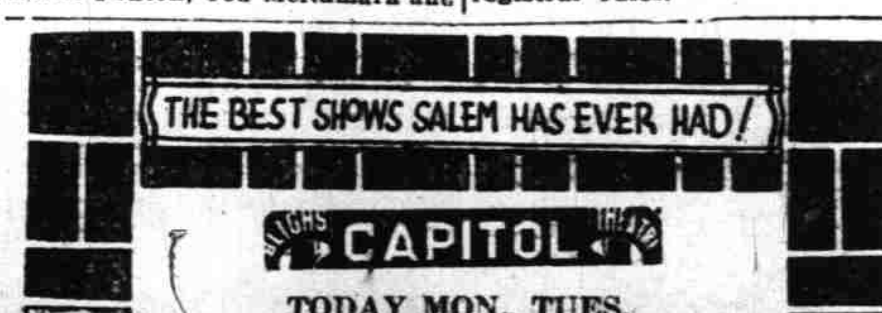

Pioneer Woman Mingles With Relatives and Friends Despite Advanced Age

CLEAR LAKE, June 30.—(Special)—Eighty years old, yet spry and youthful was Mrs. Clara Collard at the reception held in her honor, Sunday June 24, at the home of her son and daughter-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. W. P. Collard in Mission Bottom.

Mrs. Clara Collard received and mingled with her guests in a manner that belied her four score years. Many old acquaintances were renewed among friends and relatives who have known Mrs. Collard a half century or more. Mrs. C. A. McCann, a niece by marriage, told how Mrs. Collard cooked her wedding dinner 48 years ago.

Mrs. Collard came across the plains in 1854. Her party wintered in California and settled in Josephine county in May, 1855. In 1861 the family moved to Marion county, where they rented the Sol and Ike Durbin farm in Mission Bottom. In the family group were: Shed D. Will W. Yate Northcutt, Mrs. Mary Weaver, Dora Northcutt, Clara Smith (now Mrs. Clara Collard) and the mother, Mrs. Sarah Smith.

In 1864 the family bought the J. M. Garrison farm where they made their permanent home. The home place is now owned by Late Townsend. Clara Smith married William M. Collard June 24, 1868. Of her family of five children, only one son is living, W. P. Collard of Mission Bottom. She has five grandchildren: Mrs. Harry Rhodes (Winnifred Beers), Oliver Beers, Mrs. Wendell Barnett (Alice Colwell), William Collard and Claire Collard.

TURNOVER \$104,084

State Land Office Makes June Payment To Treasurer

The state land department turned over to the state treasurer during the month of June \$104,084.42, according to a report prepared here Saturday by George G. Brown, clerk of the state land board.

BELGIAN ROYALTY USES PLANE ON TOUR

take care of the forty trunks and smaller pieces.

If the negro population of the Congo expects to see a spectacular display of golden crowns and royal purple on the persons of the visiting sovereigns, it is likely to be disappointed. The queen's trunks contain only a few court gowns in which to appear at official receptions here and at Elizabethville.

Shooting costumes, serviceable motor coats and dusters and flying suits take up most of the space in her traveling kit, for the royal party will carry only suitcases and light hand baggage on the major portion of their journey through the Congo, many hundreds of miles of which will be made by air.

The airplane journey, to which their Belgian majesties, both enthusiastic fliers, are looking forward eagerly, covers practically all the principal air routes which have been charted for commercial purposes in the Congo during the past few years. The royal party is departing tomorrow way air for Ashikapa, 240 miles away, to visit the famous diamond fields, discovered there shortly before the war and now rivaling in output the Cape mines.

The principal diamond deposits are situated in a sparsely populated region well towards the middle section of the Kasai River, once the only means of access. Now a new railway line is being built from Port Francqui to Bukama, and the king and queen will officially open it upon their arrival at Port Francqui on June 6.

The new railway line, over which the Belgian sovereigns will make the first trip by special train, is a narrow gauge road 60 miles long, connecting the Lower Congo with the Katanga district and British Rhodesia.

From Elizabethville, the capital of the Katanga district, the royal party intends visiting the Congo's principal mining and industrial centers. Of special interest to Queen Elizabeth is the opportunity to inspect the hospitals and research laboratories. The queen, herself a trained nurse, has made a special study of diseases which afflict the Congo.
