Grim determination to clinch the Willamette Valley league title at Bend today or die, figuratively speaking, in the effort, was readable on the faces of the Salem Senator ball players as they showed spiked shoes and hats into automobiles and crowded themselves into the remaining space for the long trip across the Cascades Saturday afternoon.

Since there is general agreement that today's game will decide the first half title, a considerable number of fans have started for Bend and more were planning to leave in the wee sma' hours this morning, despite the fact that the game is to be played nearly 200 miles from home.

Incidentally the outcome of this game will probably determine whether the Senators decide to go through the second half. Contrary to rumor, the boys haven't decided to quit when the first half is over; neither are they certain of going ahead. If they win the first half title it is considerably better than an even chance that they will continue.

Not that the Senators will quit if they lose and go on if they win; that isn't the issue. The whole problem is financial, and the players figure if they can win the first half, the support will be big enough to take them through the rest of the season, whereas it probably wouldn't be sufficient if they lose.

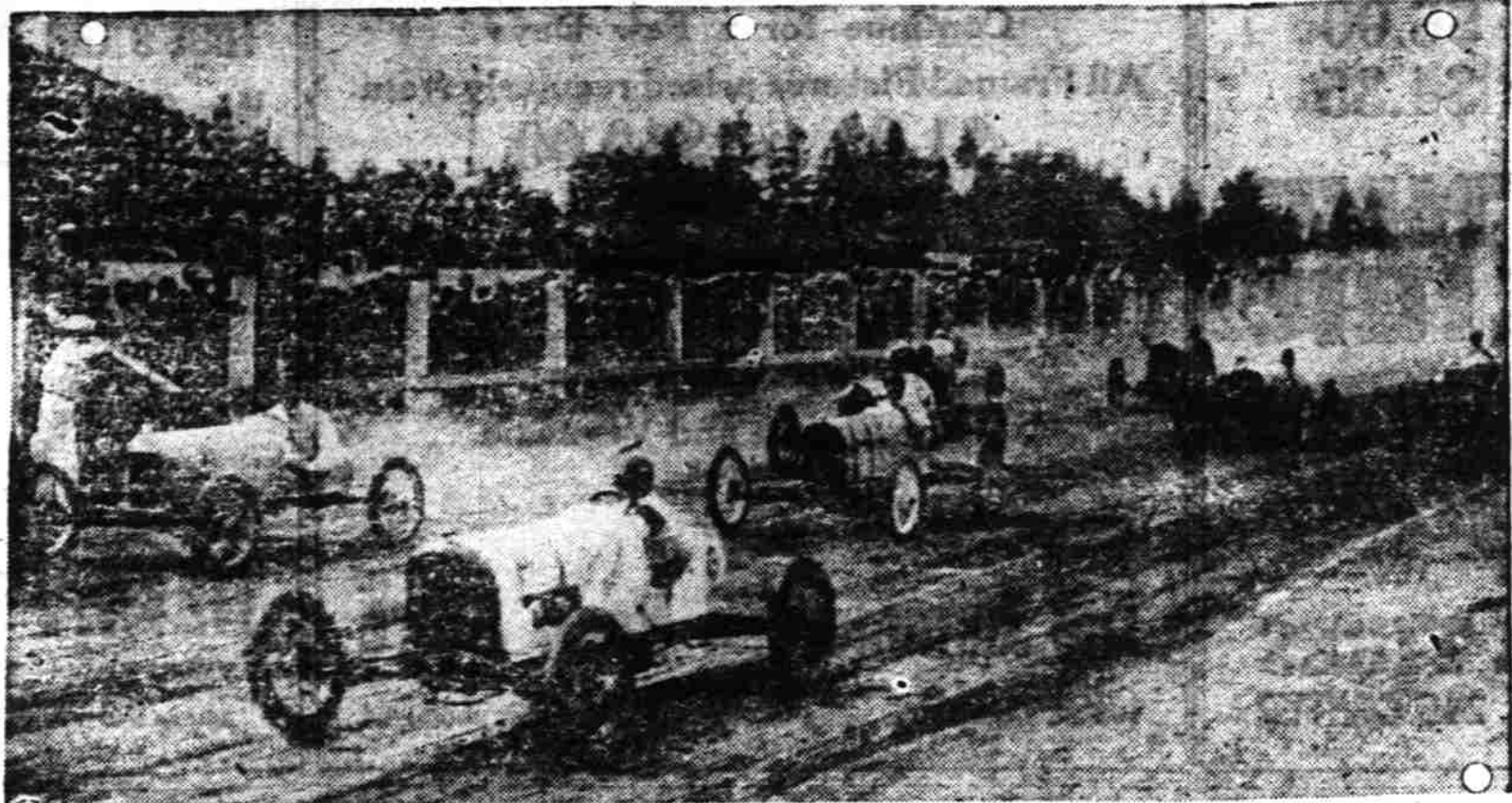
Every man on the team was in good shape when they left Saturday, and there won't be any alibis if they lose. The fact that playing on the other side of the Cascades handicaps a team is not an alibi, as the Bend team was equally handicapped when it played here.

The Salem Senators and Bend Eagles will play two additional games, Tuesday and Wednesday at Bend, but these will have no bearing on the league standings. Albany and Eugene are expected to have little trouble in winning the other two games on today's program. Albany has been itching for revenge on Wendling, which spoiled the Alcos' pennant hopes by routing Red Rupert's proteges at Wendling a few weeks ago. Billy Reinhart's Eugene team may be bothered by the delivery of Leo Smith, Cottage Grove's new hurler, but the university city boys are heavy favorites.

Whichever team wins at Bend tomorrow will drop into a tie with Albany provided that Albany overcomes the Wendling attack.

Next Sunday Bend plays at Eugene, Salem at Wendling and Albany at Cottage Grove, all postponed games, which will wind up the first half of the season.

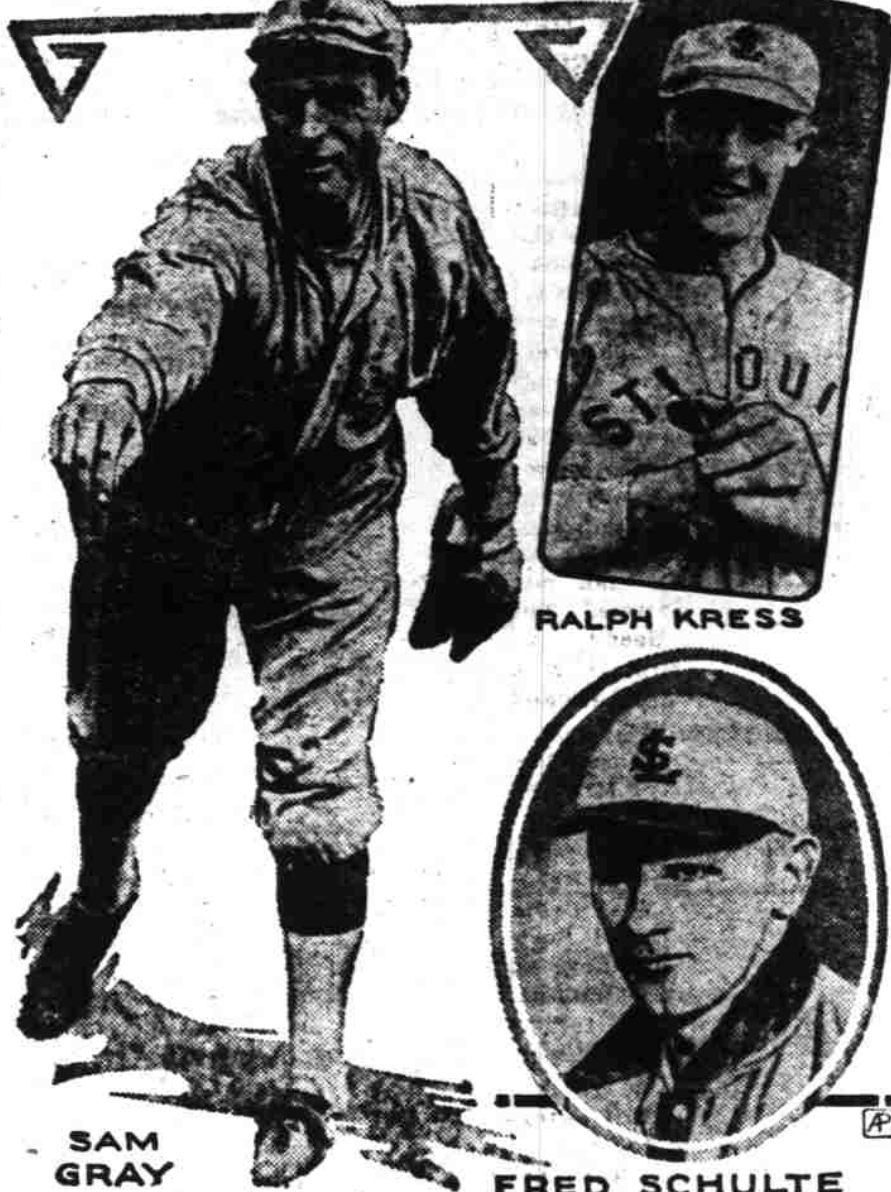
