Portland Banks Report Substantial Increases

PORTLAND, July 3.—(AP)—Resources of Portland's 26 banks as of June 30 were \$3,008,110 greater than on February 28 of this year, figures were compiled today following a call by the national comptroller of currency and by the state banking department.

Loans and discounts of the local banks dropped from \$74,287,332 on February 28 to \$69,219,171 as of June 30.

That credit conditions are sound is shown by the decrease in loans and discounts which were as high as \$92,111,582 in March 1925.

Part of the difference is accounted for by larger investments in bonds and similar securities but a good part represents decreases in local borrowings.

PHILADELPHIA, July 3.—(AP)—The world's record for the 400 meter hurdles was broken twice in successive heats in the national championships and final Olympic trials today, first by F. Morgan Taylor of the Illinois A. C. Olympic champion, and then by Frank Cuhel, of the University of Iowa, national collegiate A. A. champion.

Taylor, who had equalled the world record time in his first heat, beat the mark by one-fifth of a second in the first of the semi-final heats when he topped the barriers in 53.34 seconds beating his rival, Jonny Gibson of the Bloomfield, N. J., Catholic lycium by three yards.

Hawkes.

Meanwhile the American champions and defending Wimbledon titleholders, Big Bill Tilden and Frank Hunter, off to a slow start, finished with a brilliant flourish to conquer the English Davis cup team of George Crole-Rees and Cyril Eames, in another four set affair, 4-6, 6-1, 6-3, 6-2.

The other American combination, composed of George Lott and John Hennessey were on the high road to another clean cut victory when rain halted their match with the young Australians, Cummons and Moon, after two sets. The score at that time was 6-1, 6-1.

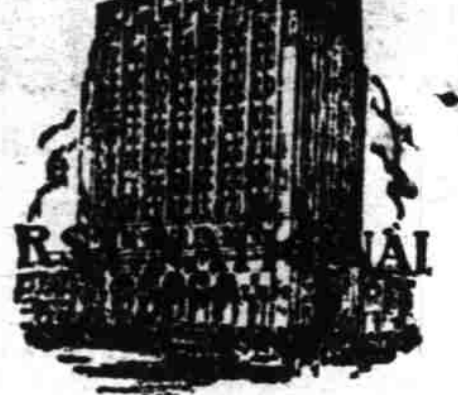

OLYMPIC SWIMMING STARS SET MARKS

ROCKAWAY BEACH, N. Y., July 3.—(AP)—Concluding a four day orgy of record breaking in the tryouts for the women's Olympic swimming team and the national championship events, three more world's marks were beaten today in two races:

Martha Norelius, of New York, who will defend her Olympic 400 meter title at Amsterdam in August, brought her total for the four days up to six by winning the 880 yard championship for the second consecutive year in the record breaking time of 11 minutes, 56.3 seconds. The former record of 12:17.4 was set by Miss Norelius in winning the title last year. At the 500 meter mark in the race the brightest of the women's swimming association of New York, was timed in seven minutes, 22.4 seconds, more than 16 seconds ahead of the accepted world's record for the distance.

Bradshaw Harrison, San Francisco, titleholder, did not play in the singles, but paired with Sidney Smith of Tacoma, won two matches in the doubles, defeating Ailing and Walter Goss in the first 6-1, 7-9, 6-1, and beating Jack Grossmayer and Ed. O'Hara of Portland in the second, 6-2, 7-5. Joe Coughlin, San Francisco, eliminated Milt Frohman, Portland, 6-0, 6-0. Henry Prusoff, Seattle, was too much for Eric V. Hauser, Portland, winning 7-5, 6-1; and Lloyd Nordstrom, Seattle, defeated the president of the Pacific northwest association, Henry S. Gray, 6-4, 6-2.
