National Meeting of B. and P. W. Clubs Will Stress Programs of Education

NEW YORK, N. Y., July 6.—The tenth annual convention of the National Federation of Business and Professional Women's Clubs at New Orleans, La., July 9-14, will probably be the most important from the angle of professional building that the organization has yet held.

The occupational survey of members of the federation carried on the past two years by the University of Michigan through Miss Margaret Elliott, federation chairman of personnel research, is in process of tabulation. It will shortly make available a flood of new data regarding the vocational problems of business and professional women which will be made the basis for an extension of the educational and vocational program of the federation.

Miss Frances Cummings of New York City, who has just been added to the staff of the federation as its educational secretary, will be at the convention and will outline her plans for increased activity along educational and vocational lines. A series of occupational round tables dealing with the varying occupational problems of the 2000 delegates will be held on July 9, the opening day of the convention, and on the succeeding day a dinner will be held attended by the chairman and secretaries of these various round tables at which Miss Cummings will preside, and at which the salient facts brought out at each round table will be presented. These facts will be correlated, and will bear their part in the development of the vocational program.

The two-fold object of the federation's educational and vocational program is to see that each future business girl achieves at least a high school education by means of scholarships, and Miss Cummings will map out a program for the achievement of the latter by placing at the disposal of the 900 clubs in the federation information as to the best vocational guidance experts whom they and their members can contact.
