

Senators at Home Sunday After Two Weeks Away; Albany Opponent

BOB QUINN'S SPEED IMPROVES OUTFIELD

The Salem Senators will play at home Sunday after being away for two weeks. Aside from the fact that the opposition for this game is to be furnished by Albany, a circumstance which always gets the fans here on their toes, special interest attaches to this game because Bob Quinn, outfielder who has been making a name for himself by his speedy defensive work, will be playing a home game for the first time.

Quinn, former Oregon State college star athlete, has a host of friends in Salem, and they have been anxious to see him perform since learning that he had been signed up by the Senators. In his first game with the local Bend team at Bend, Quinn found plenty of work coming his way when the Eagles unlimbered their big bats, and he made four spectacular catches, all of which would have been hits if a slower man had been in center field. Except for his outstanding work, Bend's score would have been bigger than it was.

With the league narrowed down to four strong clubs, all of them are going to be called upon to put everything they have into every game, and the fans are in line for better baseball than the rest of the season.

"Red" Rupert, Albany's aggressive manager, appeared confident of the result of Sunday's game when he called on Manager Edwards of the Senators Thursday. Rupert has plenty of reason to be satisfied with his team's showing, as it has won the last five games played and has allowed only five runs while doing so.

The Alcos have not been breaking any slugging records, but their fielding has been close to perfect, and Ralph Coleman, probably the best pitcher in the league, has done the rest.

Albany will have several new players in uniform Sunday: Lulay, Haight and McLean, but the lineup at the start is expected to be the same as in the last game here.

Umpires will be Huntington of Eugene and Laird of Salem, assuring competent handling of the game.

TACOMA, July 12.—(AP).—Bradshaw Harrison, San Francisco, playing for the Tacoma club, defeated a fellow club member, Wallace Scott, to continue his advance toward his second straight men's singles championship in the Pacific northwest tournament here today.

Harrison won from Scott, 9-11, 6-2, in the most spectacular match that the tournament has brought out so far, and in winning entered the semi-finals.

POSTOFFICE KEPT PURE, SAYS NEW

WASHINGTON, July 12.—(AP).—Postmaster General New today laid before the senate post office patronage subcommittee his story of the efforts made to keep his department free of charges of the sales of postmasterships.

Testifying in a session called hurriedly after the committee had arrived in Washington on a noon train from Atlanta, the postmaster-general said that in sixty-two per cent of the postmaster appointments made in Georgia since he took charge of the department, either the senators or the representatives were consulted.

Along with his account of the investigations made by the department in efforts to prevent the sale of patronage, the postmaster-general said that while he had no doubt that post masters in Georgia had been forced to contribute to the republican organization he believed it would be found that the same contributions were made to the democratic organization when that party was in power.

Mr. New bolstered this assertion by submitting a letter from W. D. Jamieson, former official of the democratic state organization in Georgia, to William F. Boone, postmaster at Baxley, Ga., asking him to raise \$75 for the party as quickly as possible.

The postmaster-general was the only witness at the session and afterwards Chairman Brookhart brief executive session Mr. New of the committee said that in a had been requested to get certain information for the committee. No further meetings will be held until this is received, he said, indicating that it probably would be two weeks before it could be obtained. He declined to reveal the nature of the information sought.
