local peaches which are now offered, the apricots have a tendency to be too green for immediate use. The peaches are good size and well colored.

The warm weather has effected the price of lemons, as would be expected; however, prices are firm. Lemons displayed in down town windows yesterday were large and full and less than 50c per dozen.

If you want to eat any more fresh cherries this year, it's about time you were doing it. For with the close of this week, the cherry season is expected to be just about cleaned up.

Local lettuce is up, with but a limited supply. This, however, is moving readily despite the raise. Information from wholesalers yesterday said that Seattle lettuce, though not now available here, was quoted at more than double that asked for the Salem yield.

California seedless grapes, the only variety of fresh grape now rolling, are coming in sufficient quantities to be shipped by freight instead of express as last week, which means that Salem stores will have shortly enough of them to meet the demand. There is practically no change in price, however.

The Dalles Crookneck and summer squash are coming in in greater quantities and are cheaper, by a few cents.

Bananas are a cheap food, due to the large amount of fresh fruits that are available from now on. And by the way, when buying bananas it is health's rule to pick those that are flecked with brown. The pure yellow skin means that the fruit is not ripe, and therefore none of the starch for which the banana is almost famous has been dissolved.

Have you tried any of those plums, and especially the large peach plum, that are in the store windows?

And of course for meal-variety, there are those nearly year around vegetables: carrots, turnips, onions, the staple potato. Green

peas, radishes, fresh onions are among the seasonal vegetables that are plentiful now and of reasonable price.

Although the watermelon season has by no means reached its height, a raise in price over the past week is now effective, with wholesalers yesterday afternoon quoting the better grades at from three to three and a half cents per pound.

The present upward trend is due to a limited supply on account of the warm weather and a tendency on the part of growers to hold for a higher market. The same conditions are also affecting the cantaloupe prices, with a 50-cent per crate raise evident yesterday.

But after all, what good does it do to quote prices; suffice it to say, there is a raise, or there is a drop in this or that commodity. In fact, when one starts to chasin' prices, one might just as well take the week off, what with prices at each wholesale house varying even in some fundamentals, not to mention the unceasing see and saw in the quotations offered by the retail merchants. So just a tip; if you want to keep posted on prices, and the comparative offerings of this or that store, just read the ads. (That's general free advertising. Unasked, too.)
