Work Progressing Rapidly On Enclosing High School Athletic Field

WILL BE CHANGED

straight lines around the big public school athletic field on North 14th street, waiting to be tamped into place, tell the story of the first step ever taken in Salem to provide the schools, particularly the high school, with an adequate, enclosed field for holding outdoor interscholastic sports.

On these posts will be fastened a heavy woven wire, with three standards of barb wire at the top. so that access to the field except through the gates, will be more difficult than it would be with a board enclosure.

As soon as the fence is completed, the second step will be started; laying out and improving the part of the field which will include the high school gridiron, 440 yard running track, and baseball

The old grandstand will not be in proper position for this arrangement, but it is dilapidated and practically worthless anyway. The roof is practically gone, and the seats rickety.

For the coming football season. temporary bleachers will be installed, and arrangements will be made for building a grandstand! later. It is expected that the high school, with its own enclosed field, will be able to make a profit on athletics in the future and be able to finance improvements gradual-

At the north end of the enclosure will be a separate field for the Parrish junior high. Plans for the field also include installing two tennis courts in the grove at the southeast corner, and later two more on the west side of the field, beyond the running track. The first courts will be principal ly for use in connection with the


