Former Salem Girl Is Guest

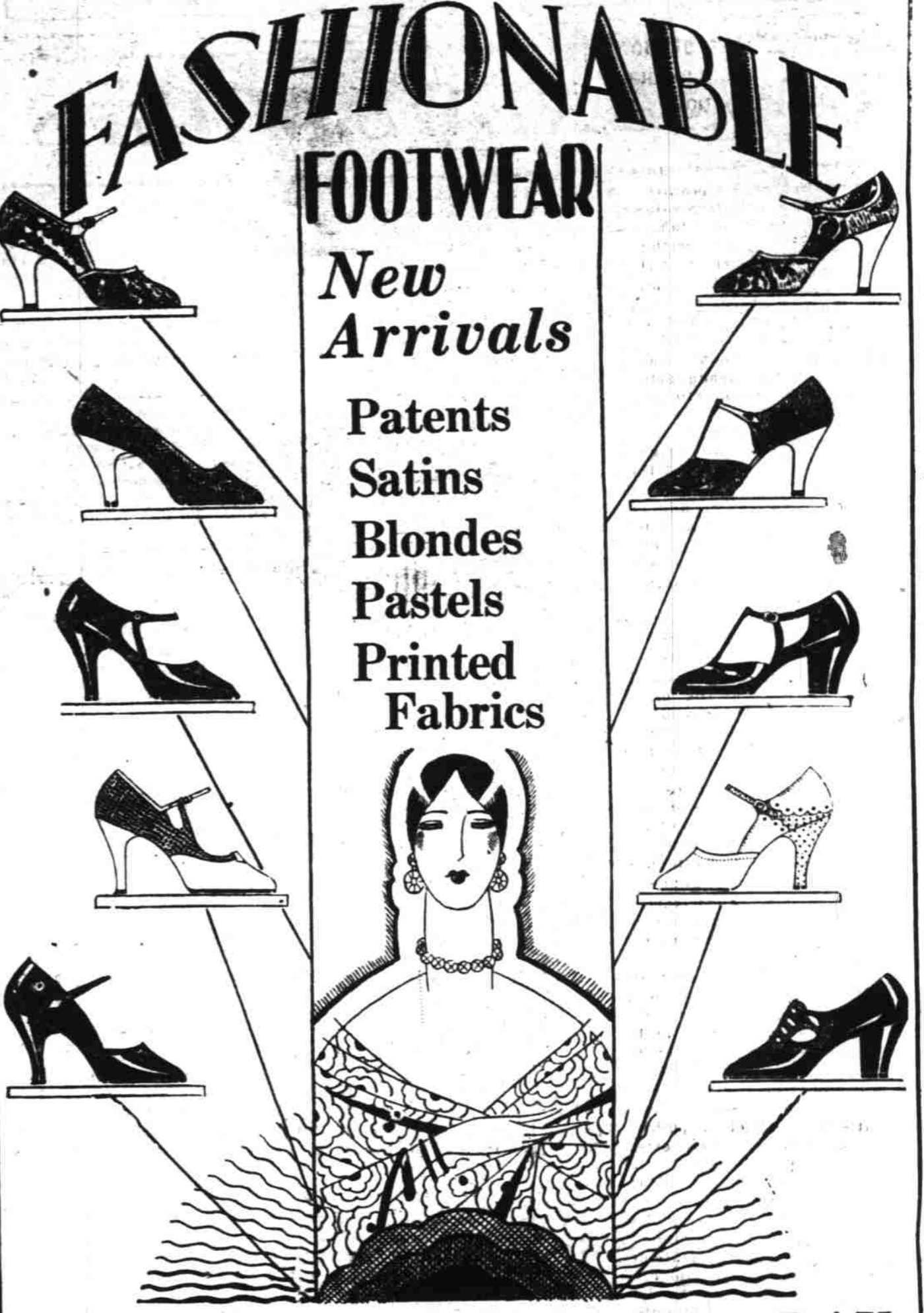
