527 RADIO LICENSES RENEWED BY GROUP

Eliminate 162 Sending Stations, Including One at Marshfield

WASHINGTON, July 28.—(AP)—The federal radio commission Thursday renewed until September 1, licenses of 527 stations, revoked the licenses of 36 and accepted the voluntary surrender of broadcasting rights from four other transmitters.

The remaining 123 in the nation's broadcasting band of 690 stations were included in the commission's order dated May 25 which provided for termination of 162 transmitters on August 1 as not justified by "public interest, convenience or necessity."

Representatives of the 123 stations have appeared at hearings to refute this finding, and judgment on their cases was deferred until August 1. The 36 revoked licenses, also were found unwarranted in the commission's order but these stations failed to appeal the decision.

One station, WEBJ at New York City, which gave up its license voluntarily to clear the tangled situation, did not come under the commission's disapproval. The other withdrawals, stations WLBM, Cambridge, Mass.; WSAX, Chicago, and KOOS, Marshfield, Oregon, had first been notified to show cause for their continued existence or stop sending.

The usual period for license extension is 60 days and the one month extension in the present cases is taken as an indication that the long-waited new allocation plan of the commission will be ready on September 1.

Stations whose licenses have been revoked included: Zone 5, KPOT, Salt Lake City, Utah; KFUS, Oakland, Calif., and KFPK, Los Angeles, Calif.

It found a different sort of weather from that left behind at Palo Alto where the start was made soon after sun up. As the travelers crossed San Francisco bay to Sausalito they ran into a chilling fog but once across the broad water way, bright sunshine was encountered and after the climb into the mountains it became almost excessively hot.

Clothes Peeled Off—The travelers first shed their top coats, then their sack coats and sweaters and finally were reduced to shirt sleeves. The stop for the night was made at Bull Flat, near the Eel river, 30 miles south of Eureka and 290 miles from Palo Alto.

The motor caravan passed through Ukiah, 126 miles from San Francisco, shortly before noon.

No stop was made as the party was anxious to reach Bull Flat near the Eel river and some 164 miles farther north where camp will be made for the night. The final destination is Brown's Camp at the headwaters of the Klamath river, near the Oregon line. Mr. Hoover will spend Monday and Tuesday fishing and plans to re-
