JEFFERSON HIGH'S PUPIL COST LOWEST

Tuition Figures Released By County Superintendent Mary Fulkerson

Of the dozen high schools in Marion county, Jefferson with a figure of \$93.85 had the lowest cost per pupil for the past school year, according to a study of tuition figures just made by the county superintendent, Mary L.

The cost of each tuition pupil attending the Scotts Mills high! school was the highest, \$163.23. While the superintendent's figures apply to tuition, or the money paid to the school district for non-resident students in attendance, the cost is the same for all pupils, both tuition and resident.

The cost of educating the individual student in the other county schools was: Silverton \$94.70; Salem. \$104.33; Woodburn, \$113.56; Union high No. 1 at Gervais, \$119.43; Union high No. 3 at St. Paul, \$120.57; Hubbard, \$117.81; Turner, \$120.34; Stayton, \$128.76: Aumsville, \$146.77.


