It was made clear at the commission office that the merger would be looked into as a matter of routine but not until a majority of the members returned from vacation.

## NEW AIR TRIP COMPLETED EASILY

HELENA, Mont., Aug. 2.—(AP) Although short delays were caused by strong head winds, the three mail planes making initial trips over the Salt Lake City-Great Falls air line here cleared their three Montana points in a fashion that seemed almost routine. Large bundles of mail were received and deposited at each of the treasure state stops, Great Falls, Butte and Helena.

At each of the cities a crowd of about a thousand persons witnessed the take off. W. M. Jarvine, federal secretary of agriculture, Governor J. H. Rowe, Montana Mayor Beadle, J. H. Erickson, chief engineer of the National Parks Airways and members of the city and county administrations joined the gathering at Butte. At Great Falls, city and postal officials were among those gathered to greet the pilots in a ceremony featuring the use of stage coaches to carry the mail from Vance field to the post office with a cowboy escort. Ray Elsmore and G. T. Haynes piloted the northbound planes and A. W. Stephenson the southbound.

## MISS MACKAY'S DAD SEEKS TO CURB RISK

LONDON, Aug. 2.—(AP)—A fight over £10,000 has been made by Lord Inchcape to provide for other heirs who might suffer from the disaster in which his daughter, the Honorable Elsie Mackay, perished with Captain Walter Hinchcliffe. They were lost on an attempt to fly the Atlantic from east to west.

The money was put at the disposal of Winston Churchill, chancellor of the exchequer. He was given absolute discretion as to its use and he has handed it to the public trustee "for administration accordingly."

## LINDY AND EDITOR SETTLE BIG FIGHT

AMARILLO, Tex., Aug. 3.—(AP)—Peace has been made between the world's most famous aviator and a newspaper editor here who says "I'm only a country boy trying to get along, figuratively speaking."

When Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh paid a visit to Amarillo after his great flight, a remark he made aroused Gene A. Howe, editor and publisher of the Amarillo News Globe, and Howe published an editorial in which he said the Colonel was "swell headed and discourteous."

Lindbergh landed here again Tuesday. Asked if he harbored ill will toward Howe, Lindbergh smiled and said he had almost forgotten about the matter. "If Mr. Howe has forgotten the incident, I have too," the flyer said.

The conversation was repeated to the editor by Lieutenant Robert H. Gray, in charge of the flying field here, and Howe printed an apology. It concludes: "So, folks, I apologize to Colonel Lindbergh and will say that I was hasty and wrong in what I said. He is a scholar and gentleman, and hasn't the big head."
