WALL STREET STOCK RALLIES

Brisk Advance Noted Many Lines Following Earlier Depressions

NEW YORK, Aug. 11.—(AP)—The stock market opened irregular today, rallied briskly under the leadership of the steel shares and then turned irregular again under the weight of heavy week-end profit-taking. Despite the absence of many traders and investors on summer holidays, trading was fairly brisk for a mid-summer halt holiday session.

Favorable trade news temporarily offset the unfavorable impression created by the stiffening of money rates earlier in the week. Weekly mercantile and trade reviews were generally optimistic in tone and stressed the unusual August expansion in several of the basic industries. The F. W. Dodge corporation reported a record-breaking volume of new construction in 37 states east of the Rocky mountains in July.

Chrysler ran into some selling after yesterday's spirited advance, closing 2 1/4 points lower at 9 1/2. General Motors showed a fractional decline at 182 3/4. Packard and Studebaker moved higher. With the exception of a 3-point gain in Houston, the oils showed little change. Amusement shares received better support. Flisk rubber preferred issues again touched new low levels for the year.

Rails were rather colorless. St. Louis Southwestern, which showed independent strength earlier in the week, lost a point on realizing. Southern Railway advanced more than two points on a small turnover.

Tremendous Crowd Packs Stanford Stadium to Hear Herbert Hoover's Speech

STANFORD UNIVERSITY Stadium, Calif., Aug. 11.—(AP)—An enthusiastic cheering crowd, banked tier upon tier in this mammoth stadium bade Herbert Hoover God-speed today in his quest for the presidency.

Representing every state in the union, it came streaming into Palo Alto by airplane, automobile, train and bus. Early comers brought lunches and were at the huge bowl when it opened at noon. From that time until the notification exercises started at 3:52 o'clock, they filtered into the structure until that which at first had been scattered groups of people had clustered into an expanding mass which extended around the concourse.

Many brought umbrellas and sunshades with which they shielded themselves from a scorching sun as they settled down for the long wait. Others, not so foresighted, hid their faces behind newspapers, whose whiteness contrasted grotesquely with the brilliant colors of dresses and sunshades.

Long before a blare of music had signalled the approach of the Stanford university band, thousands of people had clustered about the interior of the copper colored bowl and were patiently awaiting the first symptom of entertainment. A hum of conversation ran through the stadium.

FLAMES BRAKE OUT, YOSEMITE

Fire Sweeps Over 15,000 Acres of National Forest in California

San Francisco, Aug. 11.—(AP)—California's forest fire enemy, beaten back and conquered many fronts this week, flamed afresh today in the Merced river canyon in Yosemite National park and in the Guyama valley in Santa Barbara county. The Yosemite blaze started Tuesday, swept over 15,000 acres, destroyed camps one and two of the Yosemite lumber company, caused loss estimated at a half-million dollars and tonight still forced exhausted rangers and forest service employes backward toward increasingly valuable timber.

If the fire drives its way into a 7000 acre tract of cut-over and exceedingly inflammable slashings, famous ash-tree sequoias may furnish additional fuel. The region is difficult of access but additional men and fire fighting equipment were thrown into the fight today in an effort to control the flames before they sweep into the park.

Fighters Recruited

In Santa Barbara county, where the only other serious fire now threatens timber holdings, Bakkerfeld and Taft, in Kern county, were called upon for men to fight the burning in Schoolhouse canyon. Thirty-six men were sent from Bakersfield and authorities held themselves ready to dispatch additional crews.

A grass and brush fire near Lebec which burned over 20 acres was reported under control tonight. In Butte county large crews were guarding fire lines on Diamond Match company property near Forest ranch. Further spread of the fire was not expected.
