

### HEALTH SURVEY RESULTS TOLD

#### Latest Bulletin From Marion County Demonstration Gives Figures

Because the United States health bureau was satisfied that the number of deaths is not a true index of the prevalence of diseases as had been heretofore accepted, bureau members have made a continuous survey, general results of which are given in a new health bulletin, released Saturday from the office of the Marion county child health demonstration.

The bulletin lists different diseases in order of their fatality, and for that reason death records do not actually indicate the number of deaths that occur, the bureau bulletin states.

**Records Incomplete**

It is true there had been occasional records of sickness among school children and employed workers, but the available information did not cover the entire life span, nor did it include persons not at work or school.

The survey was conducted in Hagerstown, Maryland, records being made of all illnesses which occurred among persons of different ages and both sexes, and as far as possible the cause for each illness. The town group studied included about 8,000 persons and was fairly representative of the small city in that section, so the bureau concludes the statistics obtained afford a fair sample of the general population of that section of the nation.

**Results Published**

Results of the study, the bulletin further states, in so far as they relate to the incidence of various diseases according to age, have just been published, and constitute a volume of material which is more complete and detailed than that of any other similar study published here or abroad.

### Work on Cattle Barn to Begin at Fair Grounds

Actual construction work will commence early this week on the new cattle barn to be erected on the State Fair grounds this year in preparation for the annual fair September 24 to 29.

The new structure is to be directly back of barn numbers six in the present circle of cattle barns in such a way that barn six will be the main entrance to the new building. Barn number six is also to be remodeled and in addition to being used in connection with the additional barn will continue to furnish housing facilities for exhibitor's cattle.

Barn six was first used on the grounds as a show barn. At this time it contained an amphitheater and rows of seats for the spectators and judges. Later it was remodeled and used for a number of years as a goat barn. A few years ago it underwent another reconstruction job and for the past few seasons has been in service as a regular cattle barn in connection with the other similar structures on the grounds.

**New Barn Commodious**

The new barn to be erected in connection with barn six will cover a ground area of 30 x 300 feet instead of 30 x 100 feet as first intended as it is thought that the larger structure will be required to cover the overflow from the

other buildings after a survey was taken of the entry list of live stock that has been turned in up to the present time.

The new building will not contain separate stalls as a few of the other structures do at the present time although it will have the more practical mangers which have been incorporated in the more recent buildings erected on the grounds. The latter means of caring for the stock is thought to allow comfortable housing of a larger number of animals than the separate stalls would permit.

The additional structure will fill a long felt need on the grounds as a considerable unnecessary expense has been incurred in former years through the inconvenience caused by the inadequate facilities. It is expected top that exhibitors coming to the fair will be better satisfied with the new arrangements than they have been with those with which they have been compelled to get along in former seasons.

**All Cattle Off Cars**

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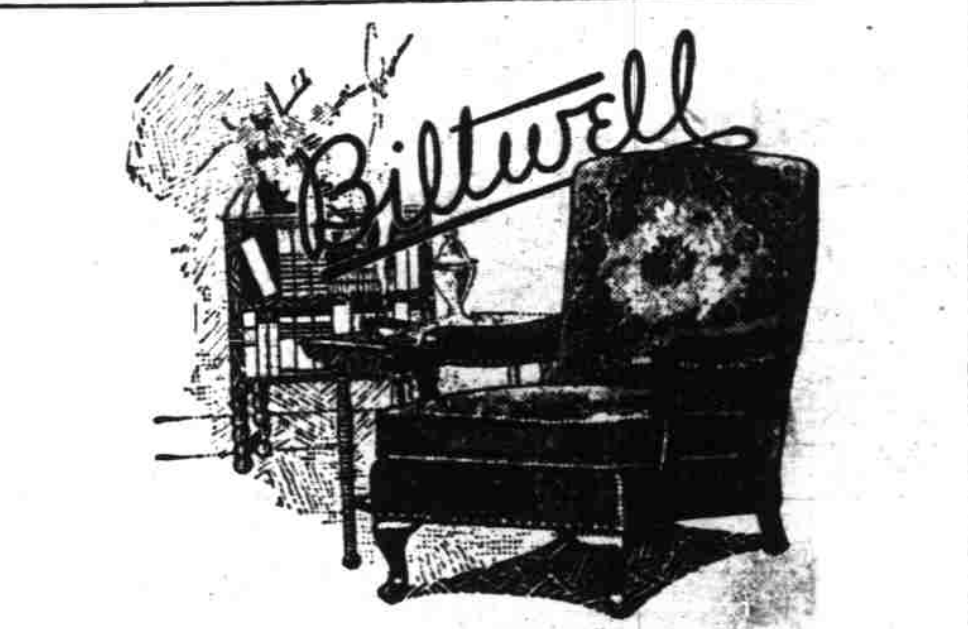
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
