

Declaring that he is without authority to enjoin the secretary of state from placing the so-called Dunne initiative measure to reduce motor vehicle licenses to Oregon on the ballot for the Nevember election, Judge L. H. Mc. Mahan of the Marion county circuit court yesterday announced those who sought to have a restraining order issued under which the proposed bill would be kept from going before the voters of the state.
