# Mickey Walker Administers K.O. to Emanuel in Seventh

Challenger Goes Down For Count In Championship Fight at Frisco

By RUSSELL NEWLAND Associated Press Sports Writer RECREATION PARK, San Francisco, Cal., Aug. 27—(AP)— Mickey Walker, middleweight champion, made an impressive entry into the light heavyweight ranks tonight when he scored a sensational knockout over Armand Emanuel, San Francisco, in he seventh round of their tenround bout.

A short right hand to the jaw as Emanuel came in dropped the San Francisco boy for the full sount, after he had just regained his feet from taking a nine count. He went down the first time

from the same kind of a blow. The middleweight champion outweighed 11 % pounds, chopped Emanuel down to his size with a bard body attack in winning the first four rounds. Emanuel came back in the fifth and sixth rounds to take those sessons by a slight

But he ran into Mickey's power ful right in the next round. A crowd of approximately 20. 000 persons. hinging the gate repersons, bringing the gate receipts to an estimated \$50,000 saw the San Franciscan knocked out for the first time in a career of more than 30 battles.

The sudden ending came as tremendous surprise to the assembled thousands as most of the experts figured Emanuel would cal advantage and besides outweighing his rival, was faster on his feet and superior in reach and height. Before the battle Emanuel showed that he was under a nervous strain and the first four rounds bore out the advance no-


