GRAY EAGLE, "RIVER'S PRIDE," AGAIN TO TRY AGED WINGS

Old Time Steamboat Will be Used for Clearing Away Mass of Sediment at Mouth of Slough

The old Gray Eagle, Willamette river-boat of a bygone generation, will return to the ranks of active vessels, but in a new capacity, when within the next few days it is used to sweep out the sediment from the mouth of the Willamette slough.

In the early nineties, when this vessel was young, it was the pride of the Willamette river. It was the first boat in history to make the run between Portland and Salem and repaired generally. On Monday there will be a government inspection.

Not all the Gray Eagle's old friends have left this section of the world. Adrian Kemp, who knew the boat well and whose father built it, lives less than a block from the slough bank to which it is tied.

Captain Spong Recalled
Andrew Jackson Spong, who was captain of her when she first made history by maintaining her schedule through the summer, later became a member of the Spong's Landing, and the amusement park 12 miles north of Salem is still called by many, although officially it is now named Woodland park. His brother, John Spong, who also goes by the term "captain," owns and operates the boathouse at the foot of Chemeketa street.

Although the Gray Eagle's regular route was between Portland and Salem, and she made this run three times a week, she has also

been up the river as far as Eugene. Boats made that run much of the year when the Gray Eagle was young. That was before the day of the highway and the automobile. It was even before trains amounted to much in Oregon. It was the day when boats were boats, and the Gray Eagle could hold its own with any of them.
