SUPREME COURT TO CONVENE TUESDAY

The state supreme court which recessed more than a month ago for the summer vacation will reconvene here Tuesday. More than a dozen legal opinions will be handed down on the first day of the new term.

The court also probably will decide whether the state grange and other organizations will be allowed to join the defense in the suit brought by the state to prevent the so-called Dunne motor vehicle initiative measure on the ballot at the November election. The Dunne measure would reduce by approximately 50 per cent the motor vehicle license fees in this state.

The suit originally was filed in the circuit court for Marion county, where Judge L. H. McMahan ruled against the plaintiff. The case then was appealed to the supreme court for final determination.

Attorneys for the plaintiffs alleged that the measure would be

unconstitutional and would result in material damage to the highway construction programme. It also was set out in the petition that Senator Joe Dunne had repudiated the measure and had requested that it be withheld from the ballot.

The petition to allow the state grange and other organizations to intervene as parties defendant in the suit, was filed by Attorney U'Ren of Portland. He alleged that the suit was an attack on the initiative law now in operation in this state.
