Arrangements originally were made with the Equitable Savings and Loan association to finance construction of the building to the extent of \$35,000, the answer recites. This step was taken, and the first indebtedness wiped out, with the result that the present suit is being conducted to get the first mortgage out of escrow.

CHICAGO PREACHER IN SALEM SUNDAY

The Rev. Charles C. Merrill, D. D. of Chicago, Ill., will preach Sunday morning in the First Congregational church of Salem, Ore., and that night in the First Congregational church of Oregon City, Ore.

Dr. Merrill was a speaker at the Pacific slope congregational congress held this week in the First Congregational church of Portland. He is secretary of promotion for the national congregational commission on missions and leads the work organized to promote the interest of American Congregationalists in their missionary enterprise.

The enterprise embraces the activities of over 3,000 American pastors, evangelists, teachers, physicians, nurses and social workers at work in this country and abroad and the help of 775 nationals employed in foreign countries. The annual cost is more than five million dollars.

The career of Dr. Merrill has been consecrated to the missionary cause. As pastor he was chosen to head the committee on missionary apportionment, Massachusetts Congregational conference. In 1911 he was elected secretary of the first commission on apportionment of the national council of the congregational churches. He left this position to become New England secretary of the laymen's missionary movement, 1914 to 1917. From 1917 to 1922 he was secretary of the Vermont Congregational conference. In 1922 he became superintendent of the Congregational conference of Illinois. He took his present position December 1926. As state superintendent or secretary Dr. Merrill's work was largely the administration of home missionary work within the state and the promotion of general missionary interest.
