HERREN CLAN  
HAS MEETINGSalem Descendant of Pioneers Who Came in 1845  
Heads Organization

CHAMPOEG, Ore., Sept. 25.—(Special)—The Herren clan, composed of the lineal descendants of John and Docta Herren, pioneers of 1845, met for its annual reunion at Champoe park on Sunday, Sept. 23.

The families represented were children and grand children of John, Noah and Levi Herren, Bertha Herren Clark and Elizabeth Herren Hastay.

One Pioneer Present  
The last surviving daughter-in-law of the pioneer John Herren also was present: Mrs. Ellen Mathews Herren, herself a pioneer of 1853.

Many were unable to be present, and letters of regret were read at the close of the banquet, which was spread under the beautiful trees of the park. There were 25 members of the clan seated at the table, which was placed at the corner of Dibble avenue and Patterson way.

Nothing was lacking on the heavily laden board: a veritable Robin Hood feast with roast venison from southern Oregon for the opening course.

At the business meeting Horace Herren of Salem was elected president of the organization for the coming year; Flora Herren Bailey of Tigard was reelected secretary and Elva Herren Estes assistant secretary.

Meet Next July

It was agreed to hold the next meeting on the second Sunday in July, 1929.

The afternoon was spent in inspecting the historic souvenirs at the park and in playing and singing old and patriotic songs.

ALBANY, Ore., Sept. 25.—(Special)—William Doughty of Aumsville won the all around state archery championship at the state tournament held here Monday. Mrs. Harry Hobson of Lyons broke her own world's record for women's distance shooting, propelling an arrow 268 yards 8 inches. The event was sponsored by the Linn county fair association.

Mrs. Homer Prouty of Portland and Mrs. F. M. Dalley of Monmouth tied for first place in the women's all around championship, but Mrs. Dalley won in the shoot off, scoring 61 points to Mrs. Prouty's 58.

Dr. George Cathey of Portland broke his own American and British distance record for men, shooting 342 yards 13 inches. Homer Prouty of Portland won the state American round championship, and B. G. Thompson of Corvallis the York round championship.

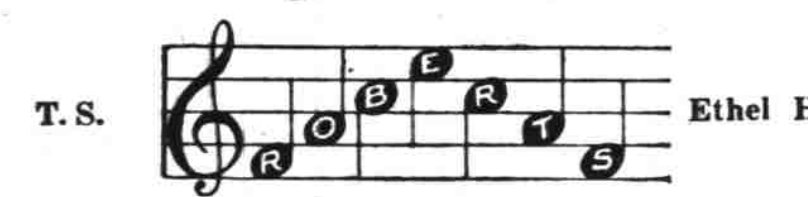
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
