

# Yanks Have American League Title Within Their Grasp

## Miracle Only Thing That Can Salvage Pennant For Philadelphia Athletics

DETROIT, Mich., Sept. 27.—(AP)—It's all over but the shouting, only the Yankees are in no mood to shout. The Yanks trimmed the Tigers in both ends of today's double-header by scores of 4 to 3 and 8 to 5, although a reeling procession of New York pitchers in the second clash had to have the help of darkness which ended the spectacle at the end of the seventh session.

The champions so advanced to a point where one more victory in three games or one more Athletic defeat in the same number would make a New York pennant triumph certain. It would seem that even the crippled Yankees should accomplish this much. The Huguenot led tonight by two and one-half games, as the Macks had but one to win in Chicago.

The first clash witnessed Waite Hoyt's twenty-first triumph and his last of the season unless a couple of earthquakes overtake the Yanks between now and Sunday. Owen Carroll gave him battle all the way. The least said about the pitchers in the second game, the better. Fred Heimach was officially accused of winning it, but could easily prove his innocence, as also could his successors, Al Shealy and Henry Johnson.

**Babe Gets Homers**  
Limping along on nothing much but his great heart, Babe Ruth smashed Carroll for a home run in the first round of the opener and repeated against Vic Sorrell in the nightcap's first inning. They were the Babe's fifty-first and fifty-second homers, but they left him eight behind his 1927 record with only three games to go. Ruth gained a substitute in each engagement, and Leo Burcher twice relieved the ailing Lazzeri.

Earl Combs joined the Yankee corps of cripples when he shook himself severely in a crash against the left center field concrete. He was making a vain bid to corral Harry Hellman's triple in the third inning of the second game. Earl had to be relieved, but may be able to resume his play tomorrow.

**A's Hope Slight**  
The only hope for Philadelphia now is to win all of the remaining games while New York drops three in a row to Detroit. Such an unexpected happening would put the Athletics half a game out in front Sunday night. If the Yanks win one more the A's can do no better than trail by the same margin. A tie is impossible because of the one game washed off the Philadelphia schedule.

Two Best Fullbacks Injured on Eve of Departure for Husky Game

Some of the men left behind will undoubtedly be playing regularly before long, but have not had sufficient experience to warrant their being sent into a tough game such as that with Washington will be.
