

# TUNNEY WIRES TO LADY LOVE

### Wedding Must Take Place in Rome or Naples, Miss Lauder is Told

NAPLES, Italy, Oct. 1.—(AP)—Gene Tunney radioed his fiancée Miss Mary Josephine Lauder, tonight that their marriage must take place in either Rome or Naples unless she wishes to have it delayed by further red tape.

Miss Lauder had sent him a message from the motorship Saturnia suggesting that he join her on board the ship and continue on to Trieste in an effort to avoid publicity. Tunney has been waiting for several days with the aid of the American ambassador and consuls, to obtain the necessary permissions for an immediate marriage here or in Rome.

Miss Lauder will arrive here tomorrow. The retired heavyweight has been assured that all his papers will be ready so that he may get married any time he desires. He had left the decision as to whether the wedding should take place in Naples or in Rome to his fiancée but his plan was upset when Miss Lauder sent a radio message to him from the motorship Saturnia suggesting that the best way to avoid the flood of newspapermen is for him to join her aboard the ship and to continue on to Trieste.

In her message Miss Lauder suggested that the wisest thing would be to have the wedding where no one expected them even if it meant going to some place where they had not intended.

The difficulty with this suggestion is that the papers already drawn both in Naples and Rome would obviate the long red tape prescribed by law in the provinces of Naples and Rome while if the marriage should occur outside these provinces the same papers must be obtained all over again for the civil authorities in that place. The same thing applies to the religious marriage as a dispensation to perform the Catholic rites between a Protestant and a Catholic must be granted by the Bishop in whose diocese the marriage is celebrated.

The Cardinals will go into the series with the veteran Andy High at third base against all kinds of pitching, and the even more ancient Rabbit Maranville playing short throughout, if he escapes injury. Tommy Thevenoz is the only infield understudy in Cardinal colors, but Roscoe Holm, who was photographed in a group with the outfielders today, can play the infield or even catch if Jimmy Wilson and Earl Smith are cut down.

Few Shifts Planned  
Manager Bill McKechnie said he planned to make only one shift depending on the style of pitching offered by the opposition. He will have Harper, Holm and Orsatti for right field duty.

At batting practice today Bill Sherdel, Jess Haines and Clarence Mitchell all took a turn on the pitching mound. It was conceded that one of the first two would be called on to pitch the opening game although the Cardinal manager was reticent.

Henry Johnson, Fred Helmach and Tom Zachary worked for the Yankees and Waite Hoyt, regarded as the likely winner, and Manager Huggins, bundled up in a thick red undershirt, took a long warming up exercise on the sidelines.

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# BORAH ATTACKS AL SMITH AGAIN

### Hoover Not Responsible for Acts of Cabinet Members, He Asserts

MINNEAPOLIS, Oct. 1.—(AP)—Senator William E. Borah, in a campaign speech here tonight, said Governor Smith's criticism of Herbert Hoover for acts of fellow cabinet members was no more justified than to blame Mr. Smith for the "millions" grafted by Tammany hall.

Before a crowd that filled the municipal auditorium and speaking over a radio chain of two score stations, the Idaho senator took the democratic presidential nominee to task for his references to Hoover and the oil scandal, in Governor Smith's speeches recently in Helena and St. Paul.

Analogy Shown  
"The logic of Governor Smith's contention was that you should condemn Secretary Hoover because he was a fellow member with the cabinet officer who betrayed his country, and sold his birthright for a mess of pottage," said Senator Borah.

"I don't really need any practice," McKechnie said as his men went through their paces. "We came out because it was a break in the monotony and everybody was tired hanging around the hotel."

"There is not much I can say about the series, except we are glad to have a part in it. I don't know who will pitch. All the pitchers are ready, so it will be simply a case of picking the one who looks the best at the moment."

"The fellows are all hustling and of course they will hustle in the world series. Who wouldn't?" Manager Huggins was in uniform in contrast to his opposing genius who stuck to muffs for the day. The mite manager was all over the field, going so far as to take a catcher's glove once and start warming up a pitcher.

Wears Long Face  
A look at the expression on the face of the Yankee boss would leave an impression that the situation was about as bad if it could be any worse but when he talked today, his conversation belied his doleful look.

"The news is good and bad," he said. "Ruth and Koenig are much better and will be fit for the series. Combs is in doubt. He may be able to play and he may not. I can't tell now and neither can he."

"The boys are confident and in fine spirits for the series. I am not predicting as to the outcome but I have a lot of confidence in the Yankees."

DR. O. L. SCOTT, chiropractor, said: "They've never bothered me very much. I don't pay any attention to the few back-seat drivers I have had experience with, I just let them rave, and tend to my own business in hand that of driving my car. FRANK FERGUSON, of the Orr Realty office, said: "It is a nuisance for an automobile driver to have someone in the back seat tell him what to do. For the safety of the other occupants, the front seat driver should stop at the first crossing and have the back seat driver set out."

G. D. BURDICK, 267 South Church street, said: "The back seat driver ought to change places with the real driver. If there is an argument about driving, they ought to get out to the side of the road and talk it over."

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# RACING STABLES HIT BY FLAMES

### Reigh Count, Winner of Last Kentucky Derby, is Barely Saved

CARY, Ill., Oct. 1.—(AP)—The racing stables here of John Hertz, owner of Reigh Count and chairman of the board of the Yellow Cab company, were destroyed by fire of undetermined origin tonight.

Reigh Count, winner of the last Kentucky Derby and the country's leading three year old, was saved, being led blindfolded from the blazing barns. Other thoroughbreds, valued at \$200,000 were lost in the flames.

Anita Pesbody, another ace of the Hertz stables, also was saved. She was generally spoken of as the two year champion of 1927. There were 16 horses in the barn, and 11 were destroyed. Several were brought from the flames but stampeded and turned back into the fire.

Among the thoroughbreds lost were: Sir Galahad, Leona, Ett (full sister of Anita Pesbody), Black Servant, Andal Bar, Sandal Fan, Osmand, Luena, and fillies by Sir Galahad and Black Servant.

The stables were of brick, and were completed only a month ago. Hay stored there made a furnace of the place sticky. Cary police said the fire appeared to have been of incendiary origin.

Hertz said he did not believe the fire was connected in any way with the taxicab war in which his company has become involved in Chicago. Police, however, said they believed a man had hidden in the loft, setting the blaze.

Police said one witness reported seeing the flames break forth simultaneously at each end of the large structure. When firemen from three nearby towns reached the scene they said there was the smell of oil in the air.

A large gate which a watchman a few minutes before had found to be properly closed was discovered broken when firemen arrived. Sandal Fan, who was lost in the fire, was a two year old filly recently purchased at a high price by Mrs. Hertz, and was expected to prove one of the sensations of the next racing season.

The fire alarm was given by Authora Naylor, 10 year old daughter of Arthur Naylor, superintendent of the farm. She was preparing to go to bed when she looked from her window and then cried:
