

SNIKPOH PLANS ARE ENLARGED

Membership of S. H. S. Dramatic Society Increased to 60; More Plays

The Snikpoh dramatic society of the senior high school will be conducted under a new plan this year which provides for considerably enlarged activities. It was decided at the business meeting held Friday morning.

The membership has been raised to 30 boys and 30 girls, instead of 20 each as before, thereby giving opportunity for more students to get into this work. Each member will be required to appear in at least one one-act play during the year.

Programs Offered
Another change provides that one-act plays be given probably once a month before the high school assembly at the activity period. Miss Lella Johnson, director of the dramatic group, will be assisted in the preparation of the short skits by other faculty members, whose names will be announced later.

The first big play to be presented will be Clyde Fitch's "The Truth," a play heavier than those usually attempted, although it is listed as a comedy. This will be given November 23, Miss Johnson announced.

JUDGE'S APPEAL IS REFUSED BY COURT

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 4.—(AP)—Without any comment on the reasons for its action, the appellate court today denied the petition of Superior Judge Carlos Hardy for a writ of prohibition, by which he sought to restrain the California Bar association from proceeding with its investigation of his acceptance of a \$2500 check from Amee Semple McPherson, evangelist.

The concise ruling, "The petition is denied," was written across Judge Hardy's voluminous document as the court's decision and only comment.

The petition was filed after Judge Hardy had been ordered to show cause why he should not be cited for contempt because of his refusal to testify at the bar association's inquiry. The appellate court's denial was interpreted by attorneys in the case as allowing the bar body to proceed with its contempt action. Victor E. Shaw, special examiner for the association in the investigation, stated tonight that he had not decided upon the next action to be taken.

"The association's committee," Shaw said, "may request Judge Hardy to appear before it and testify now that the petition for a writ of prohibition has failed. This course would save the learned judge from the embarrassment of contempt proceedings, which we shall be obliged to institute should he not testify."

AGGIES PREPARED TO PLAY TROJANS

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 5.—(AP)—The Oregon State college football team, 35 strong, arrived here today, primed to the minute for their Pacific coast conference game with the University of southern California at the coliseum here tomorrow.

The Aggies squad was accompanied by head coach Paul Schaefer, line coach, Jim Dixon, general manager, Carl Ledell and a trainer. Immediately upon their arrival, they were taken to a Pasadena hotel, to remain there until time for a workout this afternoon at the coliseum.

Southern California remained a slight favorite today to win over the hard rocks from Corvallis, but it was predicted that the Trojans would know they had been in a battle. The Aggies, led by the stocky terror, Howard Maple, 172 pound quarterback, have pointed for this game. Last year Southern California was able to win over the Oregon gridders only by one point margin, the score being 13 to 12.

Dakotas and Montana In Doubtful Column as Hour of Election Draws Near

PIERRE, S. D., Oct. 5.—(AP)—

Out of the political metamorphosis that has gripped the north-west for several years has emerged a militant independent element of the electorate which likely will decide the issue between Herbert Hoover and Alfred E. Smith, an element which has gained the balance of power by deliberately severing its ties with the party line.

Here in South Dakota, as throughout the former northwest, the biggest question mark hovers over the independent, who grants his favor first to one party and then the other and who never can be relied upon in advance.

Of late years this self-directing group has come to be classified as a protest vote, drawing strength mostly from the republican party but also from the democratic, and apparently more concerned with voting against some candidate than for his opponent.

In this state the independents protested by giving great support to Roosevelt and LaFollette in three cornered races, and it is an inability to fathom to what extent the protest against "regular republicanism" will be renewed this year that is baffling native political seers who attempt a bare-hand disposal of South Dakota's five electoral votes.

CRASH LEADS FLIER TO BECOME DOCTOR

McNARY GOES EAST TO REPORT SURVEY

Upon his arrival in the east, Senator Charles L. McNary, who left for Chicago Friday will report to the senatorial campaign committee upon activities of the republican senatorial activities in the northwest, his secretary, Mrs. Emma Murphy-Brown, said Thursday in a statement.

For some time Senator McNary, who is a member of the republican senatorial campaign committee, has been looking over the political situation in the Pacific coast mountain states particularly as it affects the republican senatorial activities, and just recently has made a report to the committee.

At the urgent request of the republican national committee, west division, Senator McNary left today for Chicago for a conference with leaders with respect to the presidential campaign; he had planned this week upon a trip to California, Nevada, and Arizona, on behalf of senatorial activities, but has had to abandon this project to go to Chicago.

It is probable that the senator will go into several of the middle western states on behalf of the republican ticket; he had no comment to make, Mrs. Brown stated, other than to say he thought the chance for the election of Mr. Hoover was excellent; that he felt confident that Mr. Hoover would carry Oregon, Washington, California and Idaho; he will not be able to return to Oregon before congress convenes in December, as he has much work awaiting him in his Washington office in connection with Oregon business and republican activities.
