

WALNUT PRICES ARE ANNOUNCED

Oregon Growers Expected to Have Profitable Year With Good Results

Prices for the 1928 crop have been fixed by the California cooperative association as follows: California Diamond, 26 cents a pound; Diamond large budded, 28 1/2; Emerald large budded, 25; Emerald medium, 22 cents.

The Salem Nut Growers cooperative and its affiliated associations covering the Willamette valley have fixed the following walnut prices: Oregon fancy Franquettes, 69-64 screen, 27 cents a pound; choice Franquettes passed through 69-64 screen, 27 cents a pound; choice soft shell passed through a 69-64 screen, 22 cents a pound.

Higher Than in 1927 These prices are higher than last year. The Diamond large budded of California's crop last year had a basis price of 25 cents a pound. The basis this year is three and a half cents a pound higher, and the same higher average holds for the Oregon nuts. California budded is the same as Oregon grafted; but the Oregon walnut men have changed their trade designations for this year.

The same Oregon cooperatives have fixed the prices of filberts at 20 cents a pound for standard grade and 26 cents for the highest grade to justify the fixing of a price. They will be disposed of to the best advantage. California grows no filberts.

The 1928 California crop is only 47 per cent of that harvested last year, when the total was 40,000 to 50,000 tons. The Oregon walnut crop will perhaps run to 1500 tons this year, or 600,000 pounds, against 700 or more tons last year. The Oregon filbert crop will run to 150 to 200 tons this year, against about 60 tons last year.

The reader no doubt will conclude from the figures that California filbert prices are better than the Oregon prices. On the face of it, that appears to be the fact. But it is not true for the net returns to the growers. In returns, the Oregon growers will have more money to show on the average than the California growers, because they are not charged as much for sacks and grading and packing and shipping and commissions as is charged to the walnut growers in California.

The fact is, the Oregon fancy grafted prices are higher quality than the California product of the same standard, and there has for several years been a preference in price allowed for the Oregon nuts by the dealers.

Everson to Lecture Upon Bible at Salem Armory Beginning on Sunday

There will also be a large corps of Bible workers to assist in the meetings.

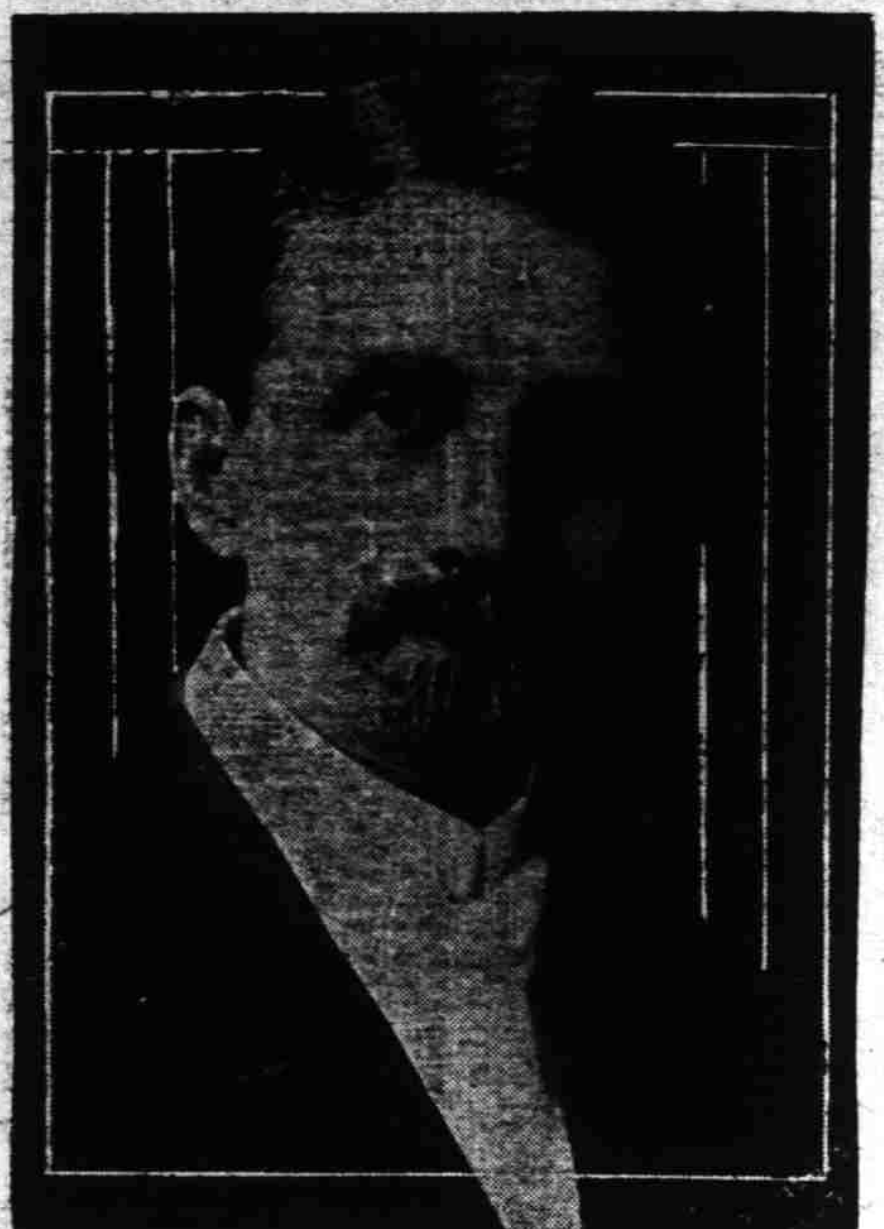
MENU HINT Corned Beef and Cabbage Boiled Potatoes Stuffed Tomato Salad

Today's Recipes Corned Beef and Cabbage—Wash the meat; cut it into shape; put in kettle, cover with cold water and bring slowly to boiling point. Remove any scum forming on top. Cook at low temperature until tender, about three to four hours. One hour before serving, add a cabbage, cut in quarters and bring to the boiling point. Cook thirty minutes, or until tender. The potatoes may also be boiled with the meat.
