BENNY LEONARD, outstanding lightweight of the present boxing circuit, at least is coming back into the racket. But not as a fighter. The manner of his return threatens another attack on the monopoly enjoyed by Tex Rickard.
Leonard enters the game in a round about way. He has taken over the controlling interest in the Pittsburgh club of the National Professional Hockey league. This franchise carries with it the rights to the use of the Duquesne Garden, where the hockey games are played. The Garden lends itself admirably, of course, to boxing shows. It is Leonard's announced intention to promote boxing matches as well as to continue the hockey activities of the club.
Pittsburgh ought to be a great boxing town if offered the proper kind of entertainment. Leonard should give it to them. A half dozen successful shows indoors over the winter would pave the way for more extensive operations at Forbes Field (home of the Pittsburgh National league ball club) when next summer rolls around.
Vic Keon, once destined to become a great pitcher, as a member of the Chicago Cubs, moved one step further from the big show, at least temporarily. He has just been transferred from the Rochester club of the International League, to the Houston club of the Texas league by the St. Louis Cardinals, owners of both organiza-
