

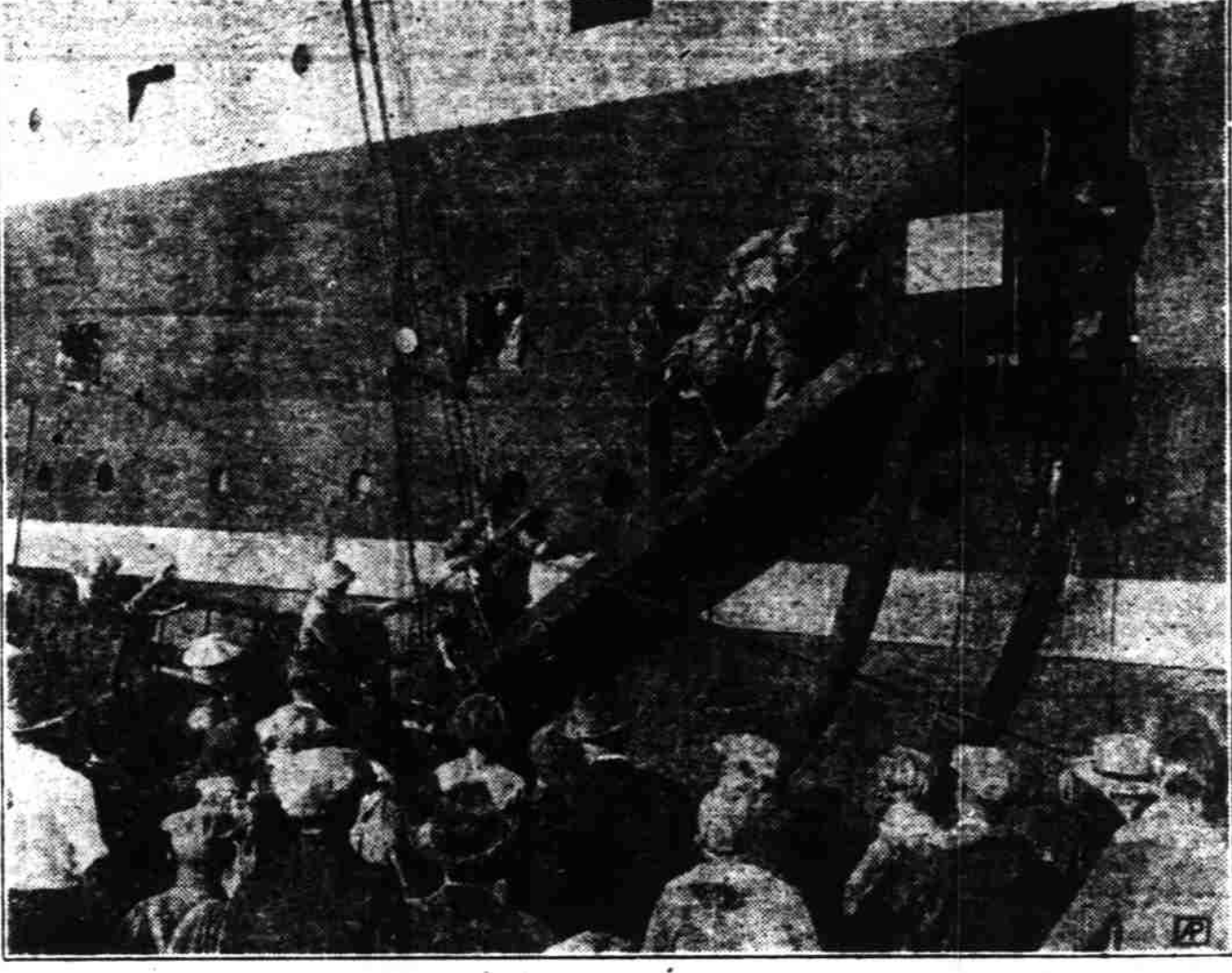
COMMITTEE WOMAN ATTENDS MEETING

CHICAGO GRAIN
CHICAGO, Oct. 18.—(AP)—Jumping up 4c a bushel in some cases, the corn market today definitely parted company with wheat. Demand was urgent for corn ready to be put to immediate use, and talk was current that no big arrivals of the 1928 corn crop would be available before the last part of November. Despite the strength of corn, wheat values averaged lower.

Chicago quotations on corn were unsettled at 3-8c to 1-18c net advance, with wheat at 1-8 1/2c to 5-8c Decline and oats 1 1/2c to 1 1/4c up.

NEW YORK STOCKS
NEW YORK, Oct. 18.—(AP)—Violent advances in the high priced industrial and specialties, several of which recorded extreme gains of 10 to 30 points, kept bullish enthusiasm at a high pitch in today's stock market. Orders poured into the market in such volume that the ticker was 50 minutes late in recording the final quotation. The day's sales reached 4,502,100 shares.

The rise in the high priced issues, many of which touched new high records, was used as a screen for distribution of a number of the low and medium priced shares.

Montgomery Ward, which sold as low as 117 earlier in the year, skyrocketed 34 1/2 points to a new high record at 339 and then fell back to 331 on realizing. Adams Express scored 36 points to 395 on a small turnover and then fell back to 288. Dupont scored 24 points and lost 7. Allied Chemical, American Express, Kansas City Southern, Keith Albee Ophthalmic and Western Pipe and Foundry closed 6 to 11 points higher, all setting new high prices.

International Nickel, which is reported to be considering a stock split-up and a merger with Moons Nickel, ran up 9 1/2 points to a new top at 176 and then lost all but a fraction of its gain. Rossia Insurance jumped 15 1/2 points. American International 8 and Texas & Pacific 7, but they did not reach their previous established 1927 highs.

General Motors moved up 4 points to a new top at 225 1/2 on a turnover of more than 200,000 shares but lost half its gain. Nearly 250,000 shares of St. Hubber changed hands, the stock closing 3 1/8 points higher at 85 3/8 after having duplicated the year's high of 82 1/2. Packard, Nash, Graham-Paige and Chrysler, lost ground.

Oil shares quieted down somewhat at the start of the session but advanced earlier in the day and stocker pigs (70-130 lbs.), medium week.
