**Crucially Alleged**—Claiming that she has been subjected to cruel and inhuman treatment and personal indignities rendering life burdensome, Ethel Muehlaupt filed suit Monday in circuit court against Walter Muehlaupt. They were married in Vancouver, Washington, April 15, 1918.

**Auto Demanded**—Action of replevin to recover possession of a 1918 automobile was combined with an action to obtain damages to the extent of \$200 when Julius Moen filed a complaint against F. E. Sylvester in circuit court here Monday. The \$200 damages is alleged to be due because of the wrongful withholding of the auto when it was the property of the plaintiff.

**Burnett Estate Being Closed**—Final account was filed in probate here Monday in the matter of the estate of the late George H. Burnett, former chief justice of the state supreme court. George G. Brown, clerk of the state land board, is executor of the will. He declares in his report that he has received \$21,095.30 and that disbursements have amounted to \$17,828.63. Total credits of the estate are listed as \$51,766.94. The only heir at law is Judge Burnett's widow, Frances Lorena Burnett, 57. Nineteen other legatees under the will are listed, however.

**Final Account Filed**—Final account was filed in probate Monday in the matter of the estate of the late Ellen Bell. The report shows \$2663.06 received in cash and \$701.08 paid out. Heirs listed are A. E. Bell, 69, of Salem, and the following daughters: Ethel B. Zimmerman, 39, of Salem; Orpha B. Mitchell, 37, of Salem; and Ince B. Skiff, 36, of Garden Home.

**Flouring Mills Sued**—Six wheat growers who claim that the Lima Flouring mills cheated them out of the price of their wheat, combined to file action against the mills in circuit court here Monday. A total of \$3555 is demanded. Five of the growers assigned their claims to C. D. Hartman, who alleged that the milling firm wrongfully took 841 bushels of his wheat. His wheat, along with that of the other five growers, had an alleged value of \$1.40 a bushel at the time it was taken. The other growers and the amounts they claim are: Leo Birch, \$609; Jennie Hartman, \$386.40; Klein Brothers, \$640; C. A. Walling, \$95.20; S. Seifer, \$707.

**Divorce Demanded**—John W. Deniston filed suit in circuit court here Monday, demanding legal separation from Ethel M. Deniston on the grounds of desertion. They were married in McMinnville on May 19, 1914. He alleges that she left him October 27, 1927.

**Robotham Arraigned**—T. T. Robotham, who was arrested here last week on a warrant forwarded from Tacoma, was arraigned in Salem justice court Monday. The case was ordered continued until Thursday at 2 p. m., at which time he will be freed if the proper papers do not arrive here from Tacoma. He is being kept in county jail here in default of \$2500 bail. The charge in Tacoma is alleged to be based on the theft of a diamond ring from a Tacoma woman.

Mrs. Bartell whose husband is a medical student in Portland, plans to go into the mission field at the end of her training course. The Rev. Schmidt of the Mennonite church at Dallas and the Rev. John M. Franz of the Pratum church, both participated in the program, other features of which were several musical numbers.
