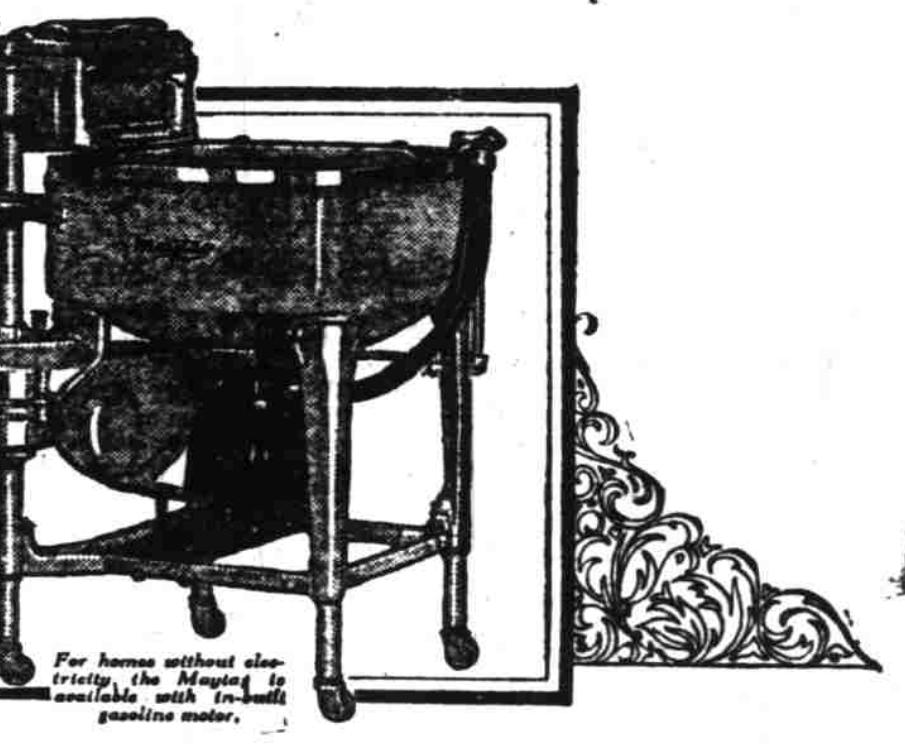
Mrs. Canse reported that the total membership of the society in all departments now exceeds 482,000, and that the organization raised over \$3,000,000 last year.
