cup butter and 1 1/4 cups sugar to a cream. Beat the yolks of 4 eggs and add to butter and sugar. Add chocolate and 1/2 cup sweet milk with 1/4 teaspoon soda dissolved in it (save 1 tablespoon milk and stir in 1 heaping teaspoon baking powder. Add last.) 1 1/4 cups flour sifted three times. 1 teaspoon vanilla. Beat very thoroughly. Fold in beaten egg whites. Add milk with baking powder in it. Bake 1 hour in a slow oven.

Mocha Frosting—2 cups powdered sugar, 3 tbsps chocolate, 4 tbsps melted butter, 2 tbsps hot coffee, 2 tbsps cream, 1 tsp vanilla. Beat until creamy.

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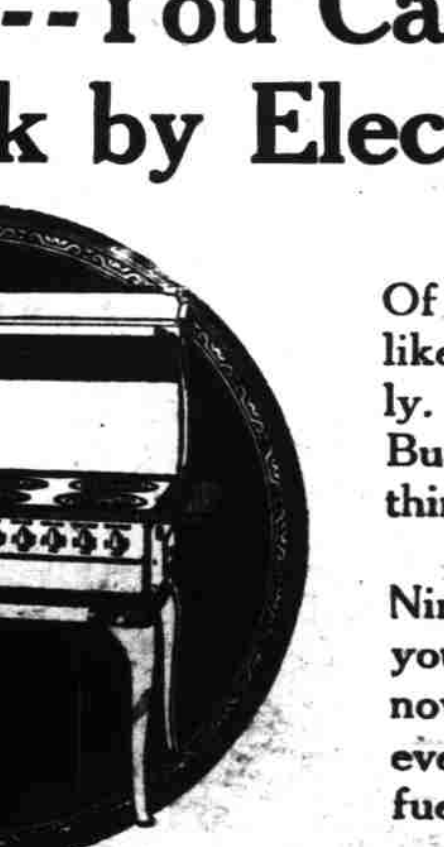
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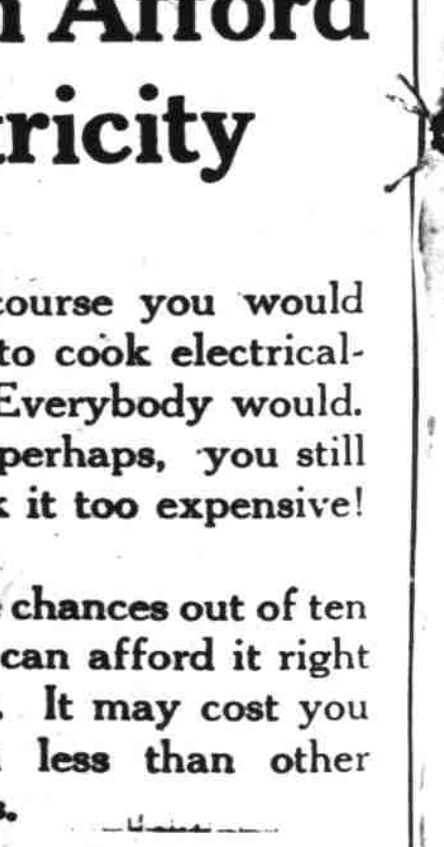
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
